CLUB HUNTS – GETTING YOU THERE AND BACK SAFELY

Just a quick note to inform you all about a new system that we're trialing for our 2018 hunting calendar. Many of you were attendance when our NZDA President, Bill O'Leary, spoke at a club night in 2017. He informed us all about our obligations under the new H&S laws, so in order to help meet them we're going to be trialing a 'signup' system for all club hunts. We've also recognized that many of our hunts require a lot of organization (e.g. the Thar hunt) so this system will help everyone involved. Details for signup...

- All participants wanting to participate in a planned club hunt need to signup at a club night.
- Signup forms for various hunts will be set out on a dedicated 'hunts' table and hopefully the
 organisers will be there to have a yarn with you.
- This will help insure the hunt organisers get a chance to meet you before the hunt and where necessary they can make allowances/provide recommendations for things like equipment or access.
- As part of this you will need to supply contact info for an emergency contact and info about any safety equipment you'll be carrying.
- As well as making us more organized, we hope this will grow participation at our club nights and allow new members to form new contacts with experienced hunters.

If anyone has any questions or suggestion to help improve this process please contact Tim, or feel free to have a yarn with any of our committee members.

Membership card update: due to some difficulties with printing we're experiencing delays in getting the cards out. Please bear with us as our club now has close to 500 members and it's a significant job which is done solely by volunteers.

Range Keys: as previously communicated, we're not doing a key swap this year as we has a new system that we hope to implement soon. Please keep your current key and await further instructions.

CLUB HUNT REPORT

Club Hunt Report - April 2019

I'd been stalking in on this deer for over two hours. I was now only a few metres below him. Obscured by ferns and the shape of the ridge, I didn't know exactly where he was, but one thing I did know was when he roared you damn well checked that the safety was off. With little options presented, I debatable what to do. With nothing to lose I let rip on the vacuum hose and hoped.

The April club hunt was at the Pakihi Hut for a 2nd year in a row. This hut has become a bit of a good luck charm for our club as we've never had a club hunt that didn't see at least one deer being shot. Having a flat, 2 hour walk in, it doesn't require a huge effort and with numerous creeks and valleys leading off the main river, there's more than enough country for everyone to safely hunt. It also holds a lot of deer as well as numerous goats and pigs...flat track and lots of animals, what more could a hunter want.

I arrived at the hut around 10pm after a walk in by headlamp. Already in residence were a couple of club members, Nick and Paul. Paul had walked in earlier in the day and had spooked a pig on the track, while Nick had ridden his E-bike in and had spooked a hind. I was quietly proud of these two as neither had much experience in the bush but were willing to give it a go. It was also an interesting twist to have the electric bike – I wondered what Les would make of such technology!

After a hot night I was champing at the bit to get out after the stags. I'd been in the weekend before and had pinpointed a steep area that a number of the noisy buggers were holding up in. The only problem was stalking in on them – the country was hard going, dry, and crumbly. Last weekend the creeping up from underneath approach hadn't worked so this weekend the plan was the drop down from the ridge above. It meant a hard slog uphill to start the day, then an even harder sidle down to them but being reasonably fit from competing in the Coast to Coast a month prior, I was up for the challenge.

I won't go on about the details of the stalk, suffice to say it was bloody hard. There turned out to be 3 stags roaring but they were in an area of steep ravines that made it very difficult to pinpoint their exact location. I locked my boy down to a small plateau on a ridge, and after some painstaking work I got in right below him. My vacuum cleaner hose worked a treat and a flash of antler passed through the trees followed by a brown shoulder. I sent a .25 caliber projectile on its way...and then the hard work really began.

If you've never stalked in on a roaring stag it's hard to understand what your body goes through. Not only are you physically working hard, but every sense your body possess is working on overdrive. Sight, smell, hearing, touch; they're all amplified by a huge amount of adrenalin that seems to ramp up another notch every time you hear that deer roar. It's heady stuff and the comedown can be crippling. In my case, the comedown occurred at the bottom of the ravine. After I'd taken the shot, the deer crashed off as they normally do. I felt sure he would have headed downhill, so I'd zigzagged my way all the way down to the creak. No blood, no sign, no deer. I'd potentially missed him so I was mentally kicking myself, and combined with the physical exertion the wall hit real hard.

Take a spell next to the creek, it was tempting to think I missed the shot and was time to cut my losses. Thankfully the experienced side of my brain was still functioning, and after a feed it told me to get back out there and find him. It's amazing how your outlook changes after a feed, I still felt gutted but I had renewed energy so I charged back up that bastard hill and give it another look over. His smell was what lead me to him, and I found him no more than 10m from where I'd shot him (I must have run right past where he lay). Now the real hard work began – it was so steep that I had to tie his back legs to a tree just so I could gut him. Then I had to get everything down to the main creek before starting the slog out to the hut. I ended up backpacking the hind legs (easily weighed 25kgs) and shuttling them down the ridge before running back up for the head, my day bag and the rifle. In this manor it took 1.5 hours to get down. I was totally spent at this point so left the meat hanging in a tree before starting the 2 hour walk out.

The rest of the weekend was a bit of a non-event. Nick and Paul headed out early while Clayton and his son Dylan came in and joined me. They had shot a spiker on the way in but despite a hard search, they were unable to locate it. They hunted hard for the rest of the weekend but couldn't pinpoint any stags. They had some fun, bowling some goats on a big slip upstream from the hut.

Final thoughts...


Hunting in the roar is an amazing experience. I've talked to a number of new hunters who wont go near the bush at this time because they're afraid of being shot. While this is always a consideration, if you make the effort to get away from the road you're unlikely to have any issues. At no other time are stags so easy to find, so start planning for next year and challenge yourself to get off the beaten track.

Hunting Permit - Have you got one. Just a reminder to all hunters no matter which area of DOC land you are hunting - BE SURE TO HAVE A

Just a reminder to all hunters no matter which area of DOC land you are hunting - BE SURE TO HAVE A CURRENT PERMIT. Of recent times while in the presents of DOC staff who have confronted 3 separate hunters and requested to see their permit in our local area none of them have been able to produce a permit. It costs nothing and takes only 2 minutes on your phone or computer.

By not having a permit you are in breach of fire arms code and with everything that has gone down over mass shootings and new fire arms laws the enforcement is only going to get more rigid.

In my experience there is also too many guns being taken into huts or near huts with closed bolts. Even if you have checked and are positive that your gun is safe anybody else seeing your gun has any idea that you have done the right thing or not. It is not hard to just remove the bolt in most guns before putting the gun in the least conspicuous place you can find. You might stay to hell with others but as the public are getting more and more paranoid about firearms I think it is up to us as responsible firearms licence holders to display as much empathy as is practical for the privilege of holding such licences. Once it was our right but it is fast becoming a privilege to hold a firearms licence.



MEASURING NIGHT 2019

Tuesday 21st May - 7.00pm

A reminder of the conditions of entry

All members must be financial both at the time of taking the trophy or photo and at the time of entry to the competition. Financial means that subscription monies are in the hands of the Treasurer and have been receipted.

All A.H.T. trophies must have been taken under fair chase rules and not have been paid for. They need to be presented in a clean and non-smelly condition. Skulls must be whole and can only have the brain cavity opened below the atlanto-occipital joint where the skull joins the spine. The lamdoidal ridge at the back of the skull must be intact. On Sika, Red and Wapiti heads the nasal bone must be complete and intact for measuring skull.

Entries in both the A.H.T. and Photographic competitions are limited to 3 per category excepting the sequence section which is from 3 to 10 photos to tell a story.





BOP BRANCH PERSONAL LOCATOR BEACONS (PLB's) FOR HIRE

Available to Branch members for hire. These devices can save lives by drastically reducing Search and Rescue times.

Members will need to:

- 1. Book the units in advance.
- 2. Be a current member and show their membership card when picking them up.
- 3. Fill in an Outdoors Intention Form to be held by the Branch custodian issuing the unit.
- 4. Pay a \$40 cash bond, refundable on return, in original condition and on time.
- 5. Pay a \$10-20 donation per trip, on return, for hire of the unit.

Hire will be on a per trip basis, based on a maximum of a 21 day trip. The units will not be insured because of the cost, so any damage or loss will be payable by the user (approx. \$640). There is no cost for the renewal of the unit if it is used in an emergency

but if possible we will need it returned. Any costs incurred for rescue by emergency services or false PLB activation will be the sole responsibility of the user.

HUNTING SAFETY GUIDELINES

Hunting Safety Guidelines (Some suggestions from committee discussions)

- 1. It is recommended that hunters wear Hi-Viz clothing at all times while in the hunting block.
- 2. Alcohol may only be consumed after the days hunting is completed.
- 3. Illicit drugs will not be tolerated.
- 4. Only load your weapon when ready to shoot at your quarry.
- 5. Identify your target beyond any doubt.
- 6. Check the firing zone for people, non-target stock, buildings etc.
- 7. Never fire above the skyline.
- 8. Unload your weapon with the barrel pointing away from any potential hazards.
- 9. Never skylark with weapons.


CODE OF ETHICS

- 2. Not hunt or carry a firearm on property without the proper approval of the owner, occupier of controlling authority and shall strictly observe any conditions imposed upon him
- 3. Be a responsible firearms owner and abide by current Firearms Laws
- 4. Avoid unnecessary or deliberate damage to the environment, respect property, and other users of the outdoors
- 5. Advocate sensible conservation practices at all times and promote New Zealand's biodiversity 'in situ'
- 6. Practice the Field Guidelines when out hunting
- 7. Be exemplary members of NZDA by promoting and abiding by its Rules, Field Guidelines and this Code of Ethics.
