

PRESIDENTS REPORT - APRIL 2020



Hello everyone and welcome to this month's newsletter. Well if you ever wanted a good reason to go and hide in the bush and do a bit of hunting you certainly have it now. A bit of self Isolation seems to be the order of the day with new directives coming thick and fast from the government and our national office. With the current situation of this Covid19 virus we have

decided to cancel public days at the range until further notice to safe guard shooters and our volunteer range officers. The range will continue to be open for key holders and Saturday shoots.

The April club night will be cancelled as most hunters are away on Roar hunts and generally the attendance is very low anyway. At this stage the May club night and the measuring night later in May will go ahead and we will have Bob Mackelow speaking at the club night on native plants etc which he presents for the hunts course. The rules for Antler horn and tusk competition and photographic comp will be included in this newsletter.

For those members that drive past the club rooms on a regular basis you will have noticed the building has changed colour. A big thankyou to the small group of volunteers who assisted with this project. We also had a working bee at the range on the 18th and completed most tasks except the 25 metre which will have to be completely rebuilt. This may have been done by the time you read this report. It would be nice to have a few more members come and help with the working bees, and considering our membership is mid 500's to only have 5 or 6 turn up is a bit poor.

At this time of year there are more hunters in the bush and back country than any other time and so the chances of encountering other hunters is high. The majority of those hunters do not belong to any organisation and as a result don't have exposure to safe firearm use instruction on a regular basis. If you're hunting on a public land then I would suggest that making yourself visible to other hunters is the top priority and above all Identify your target.


CLUB HUNT REPORT - MARCH 2020 - PAKIHI HUT

The club has now been heading into the Pakihi Hut for three roars in a row. This hut has always been a favourable location for us as we've never had a club hunt that didn't see at least one deer being shot. It also has a flat, two hour walk in, so it doesn't require a huge effort to get there.

Thursday evening saw 7 of us meeting in the Mount. We piled into a couple of wagons and began the annual pilgrimage down to Opotiki. The normal hunter chit chat ensued, most of it unrepeatable, and I think we were all relieved to be leaving the crazy word of Corona virus behind us. At 8pm we were shouldering packs and under headlamp we headed into the hut. Along the way Tom put us on the scoreboard with a couple of goats, earning the nickname of "double tap" due to the amount of shots he used per animal, and at 10pm we hit the hut.

Friday morning saw the 7 of us heading off in different directions. We had a variety of experience within the group, so hunting areas had been divided up accordingly. The weather was extremely mild, as you'd expect for mid-March, so it was doubtful that we'd get much roaring action but all of us were eager and willing to find out. My own day turned out to be a lot of walking for very limited amounts of action. Around 11am I had a stag start moaning from the other side of the valley, so after exchanging a few roars I elected to leave him be. As I was about to move off, a stag behind me suddenly let rip, before catching my scent and charging off. Like I said, very limited action.

We all returned to the hut in the late afternoon. Tom had solidified his new nickname by bagging a yearling (with two shots) only 10 minutes from the hut, but the rest of the group had had limited success. It appeared we were about a week too early for the roar, and due to the lack of rainfall in the area, the bush had proven extremely noisy for everyone to stalk in. The general conscious was that you had to get them either in the river or on a slip because you'd never stalk close enough in the bush.





Saturday morning dawned a bit slower. Bodies were complaining a bit and the lack of roaring didn't inspire as much enthusiasm. Coffee and porridge were consumed before we all headed off in various directions. That's what I loved about hunting this area – we had seven people and no one had to come anywhere close to anyone else. Navigation is also relatively easy because you're either going up or down a river so it was pretty hard to get lost. The only thing you had to do was overcome the steepness of the hills...a combination of fitness and age generally factor into this haha.

Late in the afternoon I had dropped into the river and was heading back to camp. I'd put in a big stalk and seen absolutely zilch. I was pissed off to say the least. With the river being so low, the rocks were coated in a dangerous slime, so I was taking it easy when I noticed some fresh splashes on the dry rocks. I felt even more pissed off as I realised that I'd probably just missed a chance at an animal. Rounding the corner, I looked up to see a hind and fawn trotting up ahead. With seven of us all keen for meat, I didn't hesitate to raise the rifle and snap off a shot just as the hind was about to take flight. With mum going down, the fawn didn't quite know what to do. As I was only using a single shot, it took me a few seconds to reload, in which time it took off up a side creek. I took chase and snapped off a shot as it got stuck in some supplejack.

It was a slightly odd, post hunt feeling. These two animals were by no means a stag and I guess some will question the need for shooting hinds and fawns. My way of looking at it was simple

- 1. I had meat was on the ground
- 2. I was doing my part of keeping the animal numbers down.

I didn't dwell on it too long...I had a two hour walk with a 40kg pack to worry about.

Sunday morning was pretty subdued. Two days of hunting steep terrain had taken their toll and we still had to walk out. Michael and Steve were still keen so they headed out for mornings walk while the rest of us got stuck in and boned out all of the meat. It was a good atmosphere and everyone appeared to enjoy the opportunity to learn a few skills of meat preparation. This is one of the great things about a club hunt and I'd encourage others to come along and join in. We ended the trip at the pub in Opotiki. Phones were turned on, reality hit us, and a beer was enjoyed. Until next time lads.

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

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


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Pizza Madness!

RANGE NEWS

Range update

We have now installed a backup battery to the main gate so all these recent power shutdowns will no longer affect the ranges use.


Its been business as usual for the past year or two now that our range amenity building has been completed, but there are a few new projects coming up that I'd like to expand on:

Car Park sealing

We're currently seeking quotes for the sealing of the car park in front of the amenity building and down to the firing line structure. Once we have quotes, we will apply for funding for this work.

Running Bore Range

There has always been the intention to have a running bore range (50m) within the 300m lease area. The area we have considered is just to the north and west of the firing line, shooting across the gully.



This would require quite a bit of earthworks to cut out for the running bore target line, but we can use the cut material to extend our 25,50 and 100m target lines.

This is now becoming more real. To date we have not been in a position to develop this range as its under forestry harvest rights, but the Park Management have recently advised that this area has now been programmed for felling in the next 18 months.

There will be a lot of ground work for us to get this range constructed. We will need to survey the land, work out a suitable range safety template that takes into account the topography and available land. Liaise with Park Management on access across the forestry road. We will also need to work out a funding strategy.




100m Backup Range

We have an area that could be developed as a 100m rifle range as a backup for club members when the 300m range is being used for competitions and public days. This area is behind the 300m range over to the south west.

We would need to form the accessway around the western side of our 300m range perimeter fence and install a culvert crossing over the gully immediately to the west of the amenity building.

22 Rimfire PRS Range

There is also an area to the west of the western perimeter fence line of the 300 m that would be ideal for a 22 rimfire PRS course. Who's interested in this?



The running bore, 900m and backup 100m ranges are all significant construction projects, so we need to prioritise these. My priority would be: 1st: 900m, 2nd: running Bore, and 3rd: 22 PRS 4th: Backup 100m range. If we have enough interest we may be able of run some of these projects in parallel. Which do you think we should take on first?

We will need to setup a project team to run these projects, so if your interested in getting involved please send me an email to nzvarminter@gmail.com

Lastly, I'd like someone to take over organising the range working bees. We really need to be proactive and have 3-4 planned working bees throughout the year to keep on top of routine maintenance out at the range.

We only need a half day to do the routine work, so suggest Saturday morning followed by a fun shoot after. I've picked the following dates to try and work around other club and hunting commitments:

February (say Waitangi Day) First Saturday in April First Saturday in July First Saturday in October

The following routine tasks need to be done on these working bee days:

- Replace shot out target backing boards
- Rotate drums
- Top up rubber in drums
- Top up earth behind profile boards at each target line
- Weed spraying
- Check perimeter fence

Extra tasks for next work B

- Clear up around stockpile of secondhand roofing iron in car park by drums so can give it away
- Rubbish and old ply backing boards to landfill
- Rebuild 25m target line
- Weed around gate track
- Lag water supply pipes into UV system (they froze last winter)
- Rejig silhouette frames to hang properly with top board

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Measuring Night 2020 **Tuesday 19th May – 7.00pm**

A reminder of the conditions of entry

All members must be financial both at the time of taking the trophy or photo and at the time of entry to the competition. Financial means that subscription monies are in the hands of the Treasurer and have been receipted.

All A.H.T. trophies must have been taken under fair chase rules and not have been paid for. They need to be presented in a clean and non-smelly condition. Skulls must be whole and can only have the brain cavity opened below the atlanto-occipital joint where the skull joins the spine. The lamdoidal ridge at the back of the skull must be intact. On Sika, Red and Wapiti heads the nasal bone must be complete and intact for measuring skull.

Entries in both the A.H.T. and Photographic competitions are limited to 3 per category excepting the sequence section which is from 3 to 10 photos to tell a story.

A GAME ANIMALS (Live and not in captivity)
B1 BIRDS (Live and not in captivity)
B2 MAMALS (Live and not in captivity)

B3 INSECTS, REPTILES & AMPHIBIANS (Live and not in captivity)

E HUMAN INTERESTS (Must show evidence of human activity)

(Can be fireplaces, trophies etc) (3 to 10 photos telling a story)

moving conveyance i.e. car, boat, aeroplane or helicopter.

The BOP NZDA competitions run from measuring night to measuring night, usually the third Tuesday in May. The National competition goes from 1st June to 31st May leaving a couple of weeks gap. 

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BOP BRANCH PERSONAL LOCATOR BEACONS (PLB's) FOR HIRE

Available to Branch members for hire. These devices can save lives by drastically reducing Search and Rescue times.

Members will need to:

- 1. Book the units in advance.
- 2. Be a current member and show their membership card when picking them up.
- 3. Fill in an Outdoors Intention Form to be held by the Branch custodian issuing the unit.
- 4. Pay a \$40 cash bond, refundable on return, in original condition and on time.
- 5. Pay a \$10-20 donation per trip, on return, for hire of the unit.

Hire will be on a per trip basis, based on a maximum of a 21 day trip. The units will not be insured because of the cost, so any damage or loss will be payable by the user (approx. \$640). There is no cost for the renewal of the unit if it is used in an emergency

but if possible we will need it returned. Any costs incurred for rescue by emergency services or false PLB activation will be the sole responsibility of the user.

HUNTING SAFETY GUIDELINES

Hunting Safety Guidelines (Some suggestions from committee discussions)

- 1. It is recommended that hunters wear Hi-Viz clothing at all times while in the hunting block.
- 2. Alcohol may only be consumed after the days hunting is completed.
- 3. Illicit drugs will not be tolerated.
- 4. Only load your weapon when ready to shoot at your quarry.
- 5. Identify your target beyond any doubt.
- 6. Check the firing zone for people, non-target stock, buildings etc.
- 7. Never fire above the skyline.
- 8. Unload your weapon with the barrel pointing away from any potential hazards.
- 9. Never skylark with weapons.

CODE OF ETHICS

A peculiar virtue in wildlife ethics is that the hunter ordinarily has no gallery to applaud or disapprove of his conduct. Whatever his act they are dictated by his own conscience, rather than by a mob of onlookers. It is difficult to exaggerate the importance of this fact. Aldo Leopold, The Sand County Almanac.

A member of the New Zealand Deerstalkers' Association Incorporated will be expected to:

- 1. Approach recreational hunting from the highest possible level of ethics, having due regard to the welfare of the animals hunted, and prevention of cruelty to the same
- 2. Not hunt or carry a firearm on property without the proper approval of the owner, occupier of controlling authority and shall strictly observe any conditions imposed upon him
- 3. Be a responsible firearms owner and abide by current Firearms Laws
- 4. Avoid unnecessary or deliberate damage to the environment, respect property, and other users of the outdoors
- 5. Advocate sensible conservation practices at all times and promote New Zealand's biodiversity 'in situ'
- 6. Practice the Field Guidelines when out hunting
- 7. Be exemplary members of NZDA by promoting and abiding by its Rules, Field Guidelines and this Code of Ethics.



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
