The weekend of the 14th-16th May rolled around and once again despite the heavy weather warnings. 17 women from a wide range of demographics and locations came together to hunt, cook and share their recent experiences in the learning to hunt journey.

Our first Annual Women's Hunt had occurred previously in February with overwhelmingly positive feedback from all members of the hunting community and we were eager to repeat this.

Hosting it at Sika Lodge was a great idea. Luxurious hot showers and electricity made it a very comfortable weekend for all of us. We headed out early Friday morning to quadrants all within the Clements Mill road area.

Determined to try and locate the cheeky and wily sika. Nothing was shot but myself and Courtney (Auckland branch secretary) were lucky enough to spook 2 hinds that were bedded down behind some large logs.

If we'd just been even slower and stealthier than we already thought we were we probably would have had a shot. Either way it was amazing to see them bouncing through the bush away from us.

When we returned that late afternoon all the women had turned up from more than 7 branches. For those of us reuniting from the previous trip it was a huge boost to reconnect with familiar faces, share new tales of hunting and general life stories.

There is now a sense of female hunting culture that is developing within our group. It's incredibly supportive, safe and has some very knowledgeable women hunters on hand to answer questions and offer guidance on gear and what not to do when out there.

The Saturday was another epic all day hunt for me. Starting at 5:30am I went out through the clearing campsite area and into the scrub lining the fire break. We saw so much sign. Fresh and old.

We hunted with care and endured the drizzling rain that made us think of the warm fire and hot food waiting for us back at the lodge. No deer again. Rome wasn't built in a day.





Some awesome moments taking time to sit next to quiet streams, have a coffee break and take photos of the light streaming in through the trees that glistened with fresh rain.

The evening was well planned with an excellent presentation from Maureen Coleman (Thames Valley President) about Sika Management and the offer from Cam Speedy to become involved in an upcoming weekend with the Sika management group.

Some of us signed up, all were really well informed about which members of the herd should be targeted and why.

I want to personally thank Maureen Coleman for an outstanding weekend that she made extra time to organise for us. She also took the extra time to organise a sika deer for us to learn to butcher on the Saturday afternoon and I know from many of the women they were really impressed with this opportunity.

Having organised the previous hunt I'm well aware of the work it takes to bring everything together. She is a pioneer in the world of women's hunting in New Zealand and has been a tower of strength and support for women hunters keen to get amongst it.

NZDA BOP CLUB CHILLER

The club chiller is now available for your use should you choose to pay the usage fee for the current financial year.

With the renewal of your membership it is a great opportunity to pay the chiller use fee of \$30.

This fee will give you access to the chiller facility in line with the "chiller rules" below.

- Chiller use is a privilege that may be removed if access is abused or rules not adhered to.
- 2. Clean up after yourself, every time you access the chiller.
- Use a fish bin or other suitable container to catch dripping blood etc. and remove from site when you take your meat away.
- No skinning or butchering on the NZDA premises. The chiller is for hanging only, no processing of any sort is allowed.
- 5. All waste must be removed from the premises when you take your meat away, including any part of an animal, blood, and all wastewater.
- All animals/meat must be tagged with a label denoting the date hung, name and contact number of the person who hung it in the chiller. Any meat without a label will be considered a donation to the club.
- 7. The maximum time for hanging any meat or animal is 10 days.
- 8. Do not hang any foul meat or contaminated carcass.
- Take care not to contaminate anyone else's meat with hair, blood, dirt etc.

It is preferable to hang all carcasses with the skin on and to hang any partially processed meat in a breathable bag or muslin cloth. Hanging carcasses and meat should not touch the chiller walls or they may (partially) freeze.

Respect the facility and other members meat.


Sleeping up to 16, this hut has gas cooking and hot water. Very comfortable and recently updated with a new kitchen, it's a great place to stay.

A MEMORABLE KAIMAI HUNTING TRIP

SOME OF THE SUCCESSFUL HUNTING TRIPS I'VE HAD JUST HAPPENED REAL FAST, BUT THE ONES THAT I PUT A LOT OF TIME AND EFFORT INTO ARE THE ONES THAT I REMEMBER THE MOST. HERE IS ONE SUCH HUNT FROM 1984.

April 1983 and I am hunting on the side of Mount Eliza up from Thompson's Track. As I sidle slowly into the wind, I hear a low moan above me. I change direction and ever so carefully make my way towards the area the moan came from, only to be met by a solid wall of thick bush, so I backed out of there and climbed above the area.

Another low moan, so I moved into the area from the top end, more solid bush: so I carefully worked my way over, under and through the vegetation as best I could. Not good enough Dave, as about 40 metres away, the stag suddenly jumped up and thrust with those large powerful back legs and was gone.

Too fast for me, but what a sight. A huge stag, by far the biggest that I had seen in the Kaimais. I had a look around his area, only one way in or out and that's the direction that the wind was coming from. A smart and older stag for sure. That was the end of my hunting for that roar.

The following January, with a half day to spare, saw me cutting a track from the main stream up into the stag's area. I marked the track at the base so I could find it in the dark.

was pretty sure that the stag was still around. As I lived in Katikati, I would have heard if it had been shot. I stayed out of that area and waited for the roar to start. I found a spur 3/4 of the way up Thompson's Track where I could sit and hear any roaring from that area.

Six trips up Thompson's Track, all in the dark, over an hour each way. For 3 trips, I was at the spur at daybreak and 3 times I went up at 9pm with the sleeping bag and spent the night up there. Not a sound. Those of you that walked the track in those days would know what a prick it was to travel: mud, mud and more smelly mud. Some of it was really deep. The 4WD's totally wrecked it.

The 7th time I arrived at my spur about 10pm. Not a sound, and as it had been a hard day at work, I went straight to sleep. 2am I woke up with a start. What was that? Silence.

Then it came, a low moan from that area. At last! No more sleep now, so I cranked up the primus and had a brew and something to eat, then waited. A few more low moans.

so at 4am I was off, stoked up with lots of adrenaline, optimism, enthusiasm and lots of other isms

I was down off the spur and into the stream. I followed it by torchlight for 30 minutes and found my cut track. I went up the track to about 300 metres from the stag pad. It was still dark, so I waited and waited. I heard a few moans, but never a roar. As daylight broke, the stag started to become more active and I could hear sticks breaking as he moved ground.

Then 'disaster'. He moved out of his area and into the next gully. I had no choice but to move off my cut track into the base of the gully I thought he was in. I didn't put all this effort in to be stymied at the last jump, so off I went.

With the light getting better all the time, I travelled as fast as I dared, on full red alert. There - movement right at the head of the gully. Boy, he was big and about to move out of sight. So at about 100metres, I take a snap shot that felt like it was good.

"Bang!" The stag spun around and raced down and across to the opposite side of the gully to me. At times like this, I will never die wondering, so I emptied my magazine as he went. 5 shots in total and then he disappeared.

Time to regroup. That first shot seemed a good one and I was pretty sure that I had connected at least once more, so I made my way over to where he had disappeared. There was blood on the trail, so with high hopes I made my way over the next spur and there he was dead as a dodo.

I stood there with a mixture of feelings: elation, relief, melancholy and a bit of pride, I guess, as I had put in so much time and effort to get a second chance at the stag. He was a really big red stag with a bit of age, wide spread, heavy timber and 11 points.

However, like a lot of heads out of the main bush areas in the Kaimais, some of the tines were damaged in velvet. The first shot was into the hilar region, so he was dead on his feet and I managed to connect with 2 more shots.

It took me 2 trips to get the meat and head over to my overnight camp, and by then it was 10.30am. I sat there pondering about the 2 trips it would take to get all the gear to the road end, about one hour each way, when a hunter came into my campsite. He told me he heard all the shots at daybreak, so he came up Thompson's Track to investigate.

He found my camp and the head from my 1st trip, so hung around to see who got it. He proved to be a "Good Bugger" hunter and carried the head and some of the meat down to the road-end. So it was only one trip for me. Yea Ha!

That head was placed in our Red Competition (remember the Moto heads dominated then) and along with a good 8-point Sika head, won me the club trophy for all antlered species.

This hunt took place over two roars and I guess taught me that percy is a good friend to have at times, perseverance, that is.

NZDA BOP RANGE UPDATE:

I met with the range certifiers a couple of weeks ago and we had a walk over the 900m range area.

We're only going to get 820m (900 yards), but plenty of options for intermediate target lines at 300, 400, 500, 600 and 700m.

There will be quite a lot of earthworks involved with 4-6m fill at the firing line, and 4-6m cut at the far end.

We will need overhead baffles at the firing line to prevent high shots leaving the range template.

I now need to put a team together for the design phase as we will need to get TECT Park approval, earthworks resource consent, building consents and arrange funding before we start construction.

Some of the tasks required are:

- Topo survey so we have accurate levels to design the safety template longsection and calc earthworks cut to fill balance. We currently only have lidar data done before the trees were harvested.
- Earthworks design. Work out fill volume to form the firing line platform, cut volume form 700-820m, fill volume for end butts behind 820m.
- 3. Prepare earthworks resource consent application.
- 4. Structural design of firing line structure and overhead baffle arrangement. One option to consider for overhead baffles could be to harvest the wilding pines in our 300m range and use portable was mill to cut into 400x400 beams for the overhead baffles.
- 5. Firing line building consent plans, documentation and application.
- 6. Funding: Identify potential funding sources, corporate sponsorship etc.

WANGANUI RIVER HUNT - 3RD WEEKEND OF JUNE

Find information at doc.govt.nz and make sure you have a permit. (A separate permit is required to hunt with dogs.) The put-in is at Whakahoro. The take-out is at Pipiriki. Whakahoro is approx. 3 hours from Pipiriki by road. The river paddle is 87km (3 days by canoe).

The recommended vessel for this trip is a Canadian canoe. Rafts are not recommended. Canadian canoes can be hired from a few operators in the Taumarunui and Wanganui areas. Everything is your responsibility.

The area has relatively high numbers of goats, as well as pigs and deer (particularly fallow deer). Bush hunting is the main type of hunting in this area. Accommodation is tenting at doc camp sites along the way (John Coull hut is currently closed for maintenance).

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

Members will need to:

- Book the units in advance.
- 2. Be a current member and show their membership card when picking them up.
- Fill in an Outdoors Intention Form to be held by the Branch custodian issuing the unit.
- 4. Pay a \$40 cash bond, refundable on return, in original condition and on time.
- 5. Pay a \$10-20 donation per trip, on return, for hire of the unit.

Hire will be on a per trip basis, based on a maximum of a 21 day trip. The units will not be insured because of the cost, so any damage or loss will be payable by the user (approx. \$640).





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CODE OF ETHICS

A MEMBER OF THE NEW ZEALAND DEERSTALKERS' ASSOCIATION INCORPORATED WILL BE EXPECTED TO:

- Approach recreational hunting from the highest possible level of ethics, having due regard to the welfare of the animals hunted, and prevention of cruelty to the same.
- Not hunt or carry a firearm on property without the proper approval of the owner, occupier of controlling authority and shall strictly observe any conditions imposed upon him.
- 3. Be a responsible firearms owner and abide by current Firearms Laws.
- Avoid unnecessary or deliberate damage to the environment, respect property, and other users of the outdoors.
- 5. Advocate sensible conservation practices at all times and promote New Zealand's biodiversity 'in situ'.
- 6. Practice the Field Guidelines when out hunting.
- 7. Be exemplary members of NZDA by promoting and abiding by its Rules, Field Guidelines and this Code of Ethics.



HUNTING SAFETY GUIDELINES

Some suggestions from committee discussions.

- It is recommended that hunters wear Hi-Viz clothing at all times while in the hunting block.
- Alcohol may only be consumed after the days hunting is completed.
- 3. Illicit drugs will not be tolerated.
- Only load your weapon when ready to shoot at your quarry.
- Identify your target beyond any doubt.
- Check the firing zone for people, non-target stock, buildings etc.
- 7. Never fire above the skyline.
- 8. Unload your weapon with the barrel pointing away from any potential hazards.
- 9. Never skylark with weapons.
