

EIGHT OF US MET AT
THE CLUB ON THURSDAY
AFTER WORK. WE WERE
A MIX OF HUNTERS AND
TOURISTS, WITH A MIX OF
DIFFERENT CANOES AND
EVEN A DOUBLE KAYAK.

After a 5-hour drive, we made it to the Whakahoro campsite and expecting to have to pitch tents in the dark, we were pleasantly surprised to find the old schoolhouse deserted and fully set up like a DOC hut, luxury!

The river trip began at around 8.30 am on Friday morning. There was a fun energy pervading through the group. It felt like a mix of nervousness, excitement, and the thrill of the unknown.

The river was running high and it was the middle of winter so we didn't really know what to expect.

The dogs could feel it and were causing all sorts of havoc. I think Reuben got the tone about right by cracking the first Canadian Club. A Canadian in a Canadian. haha!

And they're off, the start of an epic 3 days.

At Whakahoro you start the trip in a side stream which enters the Whanganui aprox 1km from the launching ramp. The stream is slow and willow choked but the minute you enter the main river it's game on.

We had a 37km paddle to the John Coull hut and were expecting it to take 6-7 hours, but with the high river level we averaged 7km/hr so it turned out to be a pretty cruisy day. Five minutes from starting, the first mob of goats was encountered and I believe they pretty much set the tone of the trip.

No one was quite sure who should shoot first or if there was some sort of etiquette. Well, that didn't last long, and it quickly became the first to see them shot them. If you were second, well

you tried to shoot the ones that were running away. It reminded me of a goat cull that I did with the club back as a teenager.

Our then club president, Russell Neilson, took me under his wing and explained that "you've got to hunch em up". I'll never forget that Russell, the technique still works!

Day One ended at the John Coull hut and it was deserted like everything else we encountered. Later on, I was sitting next to the river writing my hunting diary when I looked up and spotted a goat on the opposite bank.

I raced up to the hut and young Gideon was down there in a flash. With a full audience he poleaxed that goat while resting the gun on his dad's gumboot. It was approximately the 20th goat of the day.

Day Two dawned dull and damp. It just had that feeling like it was going to rain, and sure enough it started right around morning tea.

Overnight it had loosely been decided that as we were deerstalkers, we should actually try to find a deer, so we all set off at our own pace intent on finding somewhere to hunt. This is easier said than done because you still have a 30km paddle to do, and the country is generally either steep or damn near vertical.

Well, the short story is the hunting was crap and all anyone found was old pig rooting. We must have all figured this out at the same time because we all ended up together as we went past the Bridge to Nowhere.

As we got closer to the Tieke Marae, the boys were trying to snipe some goats so James and I nipped up a side creak to see if we could find a deer. James did find a whole mob but sadly some cows spoilt his chances.

We returned to the main river and could see no sign of anyone else. We assumed

they'd be pulled in at the marae but on arriving, there was no sign of anyone. This was worrying as it's a long way to the next campsite.

We were at a bit of a crossroads - stay at the nice dry lodge and enjoy the comforts or get back on the river and chase them down in the rain and looming dark.

I have to admit that I was leaning towards the comfort the fire figuring we'd find them tomorrow, but luckily James spotted them rafted up approximately 500m down river. A quick whistle to get their attention and we had a good chuckle as we watched them slog back up river.

Curled up around the fire, we had a pleasant night at the Tieke Marae but come morning some bright spark decided we needed to be up early with the hope of catching a deer out.

Picture this, it's absolutely pouring down and pitch black, but here we were standing next to our canoes waiting for it to get light enough to see. What a great idea that was!

The rain continued for most of the morning and it seemed the goats weren't that keen on it either, we just had to put our heads down and grind it out. In the last few kilometers of the trip you start to encounter a few small rapids.

One of them is called 50/50 as apparently about 50% of people fall out. I think we were all secretly looking forward to a bit of action but after paddling through it young Gideon remarked "that was fun, when are we getting to the actual rapid?" The high river level had meant for a quick trip but

Cheers to Reuben for organising and to everyone for making it such a good trip.



NZDA BOP RANGE UPDATE:

I met with the range certifiers a couple of weeks ago and we had a walk over the 900m range area.

We're only going to get 820m (900 yards), but plenty of options for intermediate target lines at 300, 400, 500, 600 and 700m.

There will be quite a lot of earthworks involved with 4-6m fill at the firing line, and 4-6m cut at the far end.

We will need overhead baffles at the firing line to prevent high shots leaving the range template.

I now need to put a team together for the design phase as we will need to get TECT Park approval, earthworks resource consent, building consents and arrange funding before we start construction.

Some of the tasks required are:

- Topo survey so we have accurate levels to design the safety template longsection and calc earthworks cut to fill balance. We currently only have lidar data done before the trees were harvested.
- Earthworks design. Work out fill volume to form the firing line platform, cut volume form 700-820m fill volume for end butts behind 820m.
- 3. Prepare earthworks resource consent application.
- 4. Structural design of firing line structure and overhead baffle arrangement. One option to consider for overhead baffles could be to harvest the wilding pines in our 300m range and use portable was mill to cut into 400x400 beams for the overhead baffles.
- 5. Firing line building consent plans, documentation and application.
- 6. Funding: Identify potential funding sources, corporate sponsorship etc.





A MEMBER OF THE NEW ZEALAND DEERSTALKERS' ASSOCIATION INCORPORATED WILL BE EXPECTED TO:

- Approach recreational hunting from the highest possible level of ethics, having due regard to the welfare of the animals hunted, and prevention of cruelty to the same.
- Not hunt or carry a firearm on property without the proper approval of the owner, occupier of controlling authority and shall strictly observe any conditions imposed upon him.
- 3. Be a responsible firearms owner and abide by current Firearms Laws.
- Avoid unnecessary or deliberate damage to the environment, respect property, and other users of the outdoors.
- 5. Advocate sensible conservation practices at all times and promote New Zealand's biodiversity 'in situ'.
- 6. Practice the Field Guidelines when out hunting.
- 7. Be exemplary members of NZDA by promoting and abiding by its Rules, Field Guidelines and this Code of Ethics.



HUNTING SAFETY GUIDELINES

Some suggestions from committee discussions.

- It is recommended that hunters wear Hi-Viz clothing at all times while in the hunting block.
- Alcohol may only be consumed after the days hunting is completed.
- 3. Illicit drugs will not be tolerated.
- Only load your weapon when ready to shoot at your quarry.
- Identify your target beyond any doubt.
- Check the firing zone for people, non-target stock, buildings etc.
- 7. Never fire above the skyline.
- 8. Unload your weapon with the barrel pointing away from any potential hazards.
- 9. Never skylark with weapons.
