CLUB SHOOT - SATURDAY 20 JULY

200M BENCHREST SHOOT FOR GROUP

On Sunday 16th June we shot 200m for group. We had three NZDA Varmint Class shooters, two NZDA Factory Rifle Class shooters and one NZDA-BOP Club Class shooter. The weather was cold and fine, with a switchy tail wind so you had to watch your flags carefully as they kept flipping from 5 to 7 o'clock (right push to left push).

Several range records were set. In varmint class Baden broke the 200m small group record with a 9.51mm group. Dave broke the factory class small group record with a 23.37mm group and Brendan broke the factory class aggregate record with an agg of 23.736mm. Both factory class shooters shot a 5 target aggregate (average of 5x 5 shot groups) better than 1 MOA, proving the rifle manufacturer's sub 1 MOA guarantee in open air at 200m! Dana set the inaugural records for NZDA Club Class for 200m for both small group and the agg. Now he has to hold onto them! Baden also received a club screamer sticker for his small group.

Thanks to Chris Fryer for helping out as NRO on the day.

So the second to last time Steve and I headed to the Whirinaki State Forest for a quick day out for the roar it was late April 2021 and I ended up deafening his right ear drum. It was his fault really. We had been sidling around the hill side all morning with nothing exciting to report. We reached a spot that looked good for lunch and sat down on a fallen tree. While eating a hind started barking down below us and not long after that we could hear movement up above us. Bark, crack, bark, crack...

Slowly we both started reaching for our rifles. Mine was a a real bush rifle. The venerable .308WIN, Steve was packing the lesser known 7mm-08REM (really an emaciated .308 if truth be known), with a suppressor??? Anyway a 2 year old stag eventually walked in on lunch and

with the 308 in one hand and a sandwich in the other I simultaneously shot the stag and wrecked Steve's right ear drum. Being the good chap he is though, he duly helped gut the stag and prepare it for transport back to the ute without too much moaning. I mean he could have avoided all the inconvenience just by shooting it first!

Roll on to 14th May 2024. After month and months of being whipped by Steve in Benchrest target shooting he convinced me to go back to Spot X at Whirinaki for a days R&R. Being concerned about Steve's sensitive hearing I had recently had DF Maisey Gumsmithing cut the .308WIN down to 16 inches and fit one of his Kaimai suppressors. A good excuse to take the rifle for a walk I suppose.

So we turn up at Spot X at 6:30am after a drive thru McMuffin and coffee at McDonalds on Fairu Springs Rd, Rotorua (something you seem to always regret afterwards!). Which way to go? Hmm. OK it's up, not sideways this year. Several hours later it's pretty uneventful. We pass through some clearings. Not much deer sign but lots of pig rooting. Shot lots of deer here but never seen one pig despite all the rooting. Rather than stay on the usually route I say let's head up around this way as I want to see what's around the other side. Do something different, to get a different result? We end up on a ridge top I recognise from many years ago. We decide to follow it downhill a while and then stop for lunch. The air is very still and cold. While eating I say to Steve give that electronic caller you have a go. After a couple of calls we get nothing in reply. All quiet. I'm thinking it sounds a bit meh really. So rather than going down we go back up the ridge. We hit new ground and I am up out front. We reach a point where I am looking down into a saddle. Steve's 50m behind me. With nothing to lose really I decide to give a roar through my hands while I wait for him. I didn't really want to use the meh caller again :-).

So the hand roar goes out. A faint reciprocal roar comes back from out in front of me. I look back for Steve. He's heard it too. Could it be another hunter as it's late in the roar? Are they still roaring at all? I hand roar again. This time I get a



strong roar back at half the distance. Steve comes up beside me. I roar again. This time the return roar is off to the left but closer still. We get in position. I'm looking at the ridge line down in front of me to the saddle and Steve's looking down the left side into the gulley. We hear another roar. Much closer this time. Branches are cracking. It stops about 6m down below Steve. Everything goes quiet. I decide not to roar again. I feel it's too close and I can just imagine it, head up smelling the air. What's up there it's thinking, a rival stag with hinds or danger close? As it's come to us I decide to leave the final move to him. Finally after a long wait he steps out in front of Steve's 7mm-08REM. Bang and a 130 grain Barnes copper bullet does its job. Steve's overjoyed as he has shot a stag and still has his hearing!

We bone out the carcass and carry the meat back to the ute. A great day out in the end. All bad memories of the morning breakfast at McDonalds had been forgotten.

MY FIRST DEER

I recently completed the 2023 HUNTS Course with the BOP branch. I've been an avid fisherman all my life, and never once gave hunting animals other than fish a second thought.

Somewhere along the line, I began to move more seriously towards a life of self sufficiency, and eventually the switch flicked in my head, and I just knew I had to skill myself up and learn how to hunt as well.

Signing up for the hunts course was one of the best things I've done. I'd grown up in the King Country and spent a lot of time in the bush and on farmland as a kid, but kind of left it all behind me when I moved away from there. The course was pretty comprehensive, and getting back into the forest on the course camps was literally a breath of fresh air, and I pretty much fell back in love with the bush immediately.

Soon after completing the course, I had an opportunity to hunt a private area of bush back in my old King Country stomping ground. It was a chance to tag along and learn from a very experienced hunter, and I grabbed it with both hands! I was like a sponge, learning the finer points of stalking, gaining experience quickly and expanding on the great stuff I'd learnt on the HUNTS course.

On morning two, we'd gotten off to an early start, and arrived at the foot of the hill we were hunting in darkness on the quad. We began the ascent up the slippery track on foot, and within 10 minutes we'd managed to spook our first deer in the scrub on the edge of the track, despite our light-footed snail paced advance up the hill. This was my first ever encounter with a deer in the bush, and I didn't even see the bugger!

As we continued on up the rise, the light began to improve and we found several large clearings to stalk slowly as we came across them. With my heart in my mouth and my senses at an all time high, I was so sure we'd find something - loads of sign about, and the wind was favourable. We eventually came into the end of a large but narrow grassy clearing, and slowed right down. More fresh sign, and we could see that the dew dusted grass had been disturbed that morning. My mentor had graciously encouraged me to take the lead. I can't quite recall what I did, whether it was drag my foot slightly, or step on a twig maybe, but we got made, and the bush right next to us exploded with the sound of hooves - I'd never heard anything like it, and I could feel it through the ground. There was no visual sign of a deer, but we could hear them around us.

I looked over the clearing and could see the bush still moving where a deer had run from the open into the scrubby edge. To my amazement, from that very spot, a huge hind re appeared and came back into the clearing. This was so surreal to me that I was kind of frozen for a few seconds. The deer was now standing directly in front of me, about 15 metres away. I could see her coat in great detail as she walked from the edge of the bush, I remember being really surprised at how grey/dark she was.

Unfortunately there was a large branch right in between us which didn't allow for a standing shot, but she hadn't seen me yet, so I made the decision to go to a sitting position to get a bead on her, rather than try and walk further into the open to get a clear line. As I dropped, I must have made enough noise to raise the alert, and she looked right at me, then bolted! My heart was beating as hard as John Bonhams bass drum - I knew I'd stuffed it, but what an exhilarating feeling!

We continued on into the morning, with a similar result, and found ourselves on the homeward track at around 10am. My friend was very quick to reinforce in me that the hunt is never over until you're back in front of the fireplace, and to keep eyes peeled and remain in hunting mode all the way home.

This turned out to be the advice that would change my life. We were now on a wide track, lined with thick bush and with clearings every so often breaking off into the bush. My friend had turned up into one of the clearings to investigate, and I carried on, still in stalking mode. Despite now being after 10am, I still had hope.

I heard him before I saw him, it sounded like someone thrashing a small tree up ahead - I crept up slowly and peered around the corner of a bushy outcrop on the edge of the track, and there, about 10 metres in front of me was a young spiker feeding so hard he didn't have any idea I was there. I couldn't believe my eyes! I had plenty of time to decide where to place the shot, he was not side on to me, so there was a bit of geometry

to take into account. Finally I pulled the trigger, and before I knew it I was standing over him, thanking the universe for a quick kill, and for the meat that was headed for my freezer. He was a healthy looking animal but had some kind of deformity of the horns, so probably an ideal beast to remove from the chain as it happened. My mentor came running after hearing the

shot, and after congratulations were taken care of I was introduced to my first real hands on experience of gutting an animal and carrying it home.

The rest of the hunts on that particular trip were on my own, which was great to experience, and great for my confidence. I've already planned a second hunt back there and can't wait - although I'm really focused now on getting myself an animal on public land, hopefully the first of many...

SUNRISE IN CANYON CREEK VALLEY

Being a first year studying away from home in Otago has opened a whole new world of opportunities to get outside and explore with my 7mm Rem mag Tikka. It is so beautiful down here, and sometimes it is hard to choose where to go next.

The plan for an overnight trip to Canyon Creek, deep in the Mackenzie Country and Waitaki area sprung into action when a good weekend of weather with no clouds or wind was on the cards. It was not your typical Friday night at the Halls of Residence as we prepped our Tatonka packs, taking care not to overpack as I have been known to.

My partner Cory and I left Dunedin early Saturday morning, travel mugs of coffee in hand, as we wanted to get boots on the ground to start our hike by 10am. It took an hour to tramp into the main Canyon Creek Valley with plenty of snow around. We had planned to make it up to the rock biv below the largest remaining glacier in the Ahuriri Valley: Thurneysen Glacier.



It was a beautifully clear night, made cosy by our epic Domex Halo sleeping bags and new Domex Thermolite sleeping bag liners

As the sun crested the ranges we woke to ice on the tent and an absolute cracker dawn. The sub-zero temperature was bearable in our warm gear. The sun peeking over the snowy tops was such a beautiful sight and any complaints about the cold were forgotten.









STILLER PREDATOR CUSTOM ACTION IN SHORT ACTION LEFT HAND (REM 700 CLONE) WITH 2 BARRELS

Barrel 1 (fitted) is a Brux 26° 1:8 chambered in 6mm BRX with 120 freebore and 0.272 neck, muzzle thread 15x1mm. This barrel has a round count of approx 800. The BRX is same capacity as the Dasher, but 30 deg should for better mag feeding and you can use standard 6mm BR dies.

Barrel 2 is a 24" Hardie 1:8, 6 groove barrel with Shillen No5 (0.70) contour chambered in 22 BR with around 1200 rounds down it.

The stock is a Boyds Pro-Varminter stock that's been modified with a 3' forend and cheek riser and Magpul polymer mag well and mag.

You may only list "A" category firearms, in sporting configuration, as defined by the Arms Act 1983. Large capacity magazines (i.e. more than 15 cartridge: for .22 rimfire, or more than 7 cartridges for others) may not be sold. Sellers must sight the firearms licence of the buyer, or for remote sales sellers must receive written confirmation signed by Police confirming the buyer holds a valid firearm's licence. Forms are available at any police station.

Firearms must already be in New Zealand. Overseas members may not buy or sell firearms on the site.

■ INGREDIENTS

- 2 pounds goat meat
- 4 whole cloves or a pinch of ground cloves
- 2 cardamom pods or a pinch of ground cardamom
- 2 red onions chopped
- 11/2 inch knob fresh ginger minced
- 3 cloves garlic minced
- 1-2 Serrano pepper minced
- 1 tablespoon ghee
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 tablespoon coriander powder
- 2 teaspoons salt adjust to taste

- 2 teaspoons Kashmiri chili powder or Paprika
- 1 teaspoon cumin powder
- 1 teaspoon turmeric powder
- 1/8 1/4 teaspoon cayenne to taste

ADD LATER:

- 128 ounce can diced tomatoes
- 1 teaspoon garam masala to taste
- ½ 1 cup water depending on how thick you'd
- like the curry

METHOD

- In a coffee grinder, finely grind cloves and cardamom. In crock pot, add all ingredients listed except tomatoes, water and garam masala (you will add this at the end).
- Set to high and cook for 4 hours stirring the curry every hour or so. After four hours, add tomatoes, garam masala and water. Cook on high for another hour or until the meat is tender.

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NZDA BOP CLUB CHILLER

CHILLER USE RULES

- Chiller use is a privilege that may be removed if access is abused or rules not adhered to.
- Clean up after yourself, every time you access the chiller.
- Use a fish bin or other suitable container to catch dripping blood etc. and remove from site when you take your meat away.
- No skinning or butchering on the NZDA premises. The chiller is for hanging only, no processing of any sort is allowed.
- All waste must be removed from the premises when you take your meat away, including any part of an animal, blood, and all wastewater.
- All animals/meat must be tagged with a label denoting the date hung, name and contact number of the person who hung it in the chiller. Any meat without a label will be considered a donation to the club.
- The maximum time for hanging any meat or animal is 10 days.
- Do not hang any foul meat or contaminated carcasses.
- Take care not to contaminate anyone else's meat with hair, blood, dirt etc.

It is preferable to hang all carcasses with the skin on and to hang any partially processed meat in a breathable bag or muslin cloth. Hanging carcasses and meat should not touch the chiller walls or they may (partially) freeze.

Respect the facility and other members meat.

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
