PRESIDENTS REPORT

APRIL 2026

Hi All,

By the time you read this, the roar will be in the memory bank for another year, and I hope you are in the process of cleaning up your heads for measuring.

For our annual AHT competition, this year we are taking a different approach and running measuring day on May the 16th, not a measuring night like previous years. With only a handful of Douglas scorers in our club, we noticed that the measuring night placed an unnecessary burden on the scorers, so we thought we'd give it a crack during the daytime to see how that's received. If you've never entered a trophy into the AHT comp, you should consider entering everything you've shot throughout the year, even if you think they might not win anything. For example, we had no goats entered last year so anything would have won! We have trophies for every species, and there are several special categories that might surprise you. For example, we have a category specifically for Kaimai heads, and given the general size of the antlers that come out of this area, almost anything may win. As part of this competition, we also have the photographic comp, so now's the time to dive into your photo library and head to Warehouse stationary to get some printed off.

As well as the measuring day, we also have a club room working bee on the calendar for the 9th of May. Some of you may have noticed that the club is looking a bit tired and in need of some love, so we'd appreciate all the help we can get.

.22 BRASS

22 shooters – pick up your empty cases & put them in the empty case bin.

- Rimfire only
- 25m,50m,100m
- Any style rifle

MANDATORY EQUIPMENT

- front sand bag, front mechanical rest with sandbag fitted or a bipod
- Rear sandbag res

ANNUAL AHT MEASURING DAY

SATURDAY 16TH MAY - 11AM TIL 4PM



It's that time of year so start cleaning up those heads and get your photos printed off!

Note: this year the format is slightly different – we are running it on a Saturday to give us more time and to make it easier to drop heads off.

Every year in May the Branch runs its annual AHT (antler, horn and tusk) competition. This is your chance to have all your heads scored using the Douglas Scoring system.

There are trophies for all species, and a range of extra ones for women, children, and different age brackets.

There is also a photographic competition with a range of categories, so check your photo library from the last year and get some printed off.

Remember you must be a financial member at the time of shooting the trophy and entering it for scoring so make sure you've paid your fees!



MOTU HARE HUNT

Me and my dad were invited to hunt Hare's down in the Motu area a few months ago. We had been practising our target shooting at the BoP firing range every month so I was so excited to go!

We set out from home in Papamoa and picked up some groceries on the way to make burgers with the meat that Bruce had ready at the Motu hut.

The drive seemed long - I thought that we would never get there, especially when someone's truck crashed and was lying upside down on the road and we were stopped for ages near Ohope.

On the road before arriving at Motu village, our headlights spotted a massive Hare standing up on the road. A good sign of things to come?

After lots of stories by the older guys and a really yum feed we had a great sleep. The next day we took a .17 HMR and my .177 air rifle up to a local farm for some target shooting. Me, Milo, Andrew and Bruce and my dad - Chris had the ATV and it was

a good way to prepare for the night's hunting. Once it got dark, we loaded up the .17HMR with all the ammo and the equipment. Benny was spotting the hares on the ATV for me with dad beside me too. Bruce was an amazing driver, he and Andrew knew just where to go and how to spotlight lots of Hares and possums. My first time out was so exciting!

We made up a call-sign of two taps on the ATV roof to stop if we spotted a hare, and one tap on the roof to continue on.

I shot my first hare from 60m early into the hunt. The Hare didn't die straight away so I had to find a stick and whack him in the head to make sure he was dead.

Bruce then showed me how to skin it and how to gut it because it was my first time. The furthest kill I got was about 100 meters away.

I also shot a possum in a tall tree from about 80m. I was standing and had no support. A great shot - and...I got him!



When we went up to a new paddock, a sudden surprise. Standing about 20 meters away is a bull and about 100 cows so we had to back up out of the paddock to a different one.

We then pulled into this other paddock that had tons of trees at the back. As soon as we drove in Andrew saw a couple of hares, Dad took a couple of shots at them but he missed and they retreated into the trees. We then drove into the trees looking for those same hares from before when one came out from its hiding place when Dad saw the opportunity and took a shot and dropped him.

Me and dad shot about a dozen Hares and a few possums. We put the biggest hares into a bucket.

Back at the hut afterwards, my Dad and Bruce hooked the hares to the roof next to the chiller. We left the carcasses there overnight. The next day we butchered the hares.

I really enjoyed learning this process from Bruce. We bagged up about 8 kilos of beautiful hare meat and took it home to freeze.

The story does not end there...

Bruce called dad some weeks later to come and make sausages with the hare meat that we froze. Dad bought some pork-bellies and I helped Bruce to mince up the mix, and created sausages.

I had so much fun and learnt many new skills. Thanks to those who made it happen.

NZDA BAY OF PLENTY BRANCH HUNTING TRIP: **PAKIHI HUT (URUTAWA)** 13-15 MARCH | 3-DAY TRIP

A three-day hunt organised by Tim, this trip was aimed at getting club members ready for the roar with a solid shake-down in the hills. The hunt combined a social outing with the chance for some members to explore new country and potential for meat for the freezer or trophy for the wall. Based out of Pakihi Hut, the trip ran from Friday 13th through to Sunday 15th March, with generally good conditions setting the tone for a fun weekend away.

THE TEAM

The group consisted of Tim, Ryan, Lloyd, Keith, Adrian, Nathan, and Jono. It was a well-balanced mix of experience, with seasoned hunters familiar with the area alongside newer members, including graduates from the club's HUNTS course. The trip also provided a great opportunity to meet new people within the club and share knowledge in a practical setting.

GETTING IN

The trip began with a 2 hour 15 minute drive from Tauranga to Pakihi Road, where a safe parking area made for an easy start. The group arrived at different times over the Friday with the plan we would all be at the hut for dinner. From the carpark you follow a relatively straightforward 10km track along the Pakihi River, gaining only around 150m in elevation. While mostly flat, the track featured a number of slips and obstacles, though it is well maintained by the Motu Trust. It is primarily a one-way

mountain bike track, but also serves as a two-way walking and hunting access route.

Weather on arrival was favourable, humid, with fine spells and only a few light showers. The walk into the hut took around three hours, including time spent hunting along the way. The surrounding country quickly revealed itself as steep and demanding, with rugged terrain rising sharply from the valley floor.

THE HUNTING

The Pakihi River valley proved to be classic steep country, with a mix of shingle slips, tight bush, and challenging access to the tops where animals are likely holding.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON / EVENING

After arriving, Jono and Adrian pushed further up the track and dropped into a creek bed system.

There was plenty of old sign, droppings and prints, but no fresh activity or deer sightings. The terrain became increasingly steep, eventually bluffing them out and forcing a tough climb up and out of a deep gorge.

At the same time, Keith headed out for an evening walk along the river flats but had no luck spotting animals.

SATURDAY – MAIN HUNTING DAY

Saturday saw a change in numbers, with three members heading home for various reasons. The remaining group made the most of the day.

Adrian and Jono headed out early, working their way up the riverbed for a couple of hours. Fresh sign was found, but no animals were seen, and they returned to the hut for a late breakfast.

Keith committed to a full-day solo mission, pushing up a ridge and onto the tops. He covered a significant amount of ground and found old stag sign but no animals, returning to the hut around nightfall.

Nathan attempted to access the tops directly behind the hut but found the terrain extremely steep and close to impassable in places. This reinforced a key challenge of the area, while animals are likely holding on the flatter ridges above, gaining safe and practical access to these areas in the Pakihi River valley is difficult.

In the afternoon, Jono positioned himself opposite a large slip face and spent a couple of hours glassing. This paid off with sightings of three red deer—two hinds and a spiker—feeding along the edge of the slip. Estimated shooting distances were 450–500 metres with over 200 metres of elevation difference. Combined with extremely limited recovery options, the decision was made to leave the animals undisturbed.

Notably, no roars were heard across the entire weekend, with the group concluding it was likely too warm and still a little early in the season.

SUNDAY MORNING

On Sunday morning, the remaining group packed up early and hunted their way back towards the car park. Despite covering ground and observing every clearing, no further animals were sighted, other than a few wild trout in the river.



CAMP LIFE

Evenings at the hut were a highlight, with a relaxed and social atmosphere, plenty of good stories, and no shortage of banter. Everyone catered for themselves, though special mention goes to Adrian—whose wife had packed enough food for a week-long expedition, including an impressive cheese board that was well appreciated by the group.

Pakihi Hut itself had recently undergone renovations, making it a comfortable and well-equipped base. Improvements included fresh paint, a new roof, enclosed veranda walls, a new wood burner, and a new firewood shed. The hut features three bunk beds, with additional mattresses available in the enclosed veranda area, a stainless bench kitchen, ample space for hanging and drying gear, a water tank, easy river access, and a long drop toilet.

Saturday night brought a solid thunderstorm, adding a bit of atmosphere to an otherwise settled trip.

HIGHLIGHTS & CHALLENGES

The trip offered fantastic scenery and a real sense of adventure, but also highlighted the challenges of hunting in this type of terrain. Access to productive areas proved difficult, with steep faces and thick bush requiring careful navigation and effort. Highlights included meeting new people, sharing knowledge, and gaining experience in a new area. It was also a valuable opportunity to test gear ahead of the hunting season—figuring out what works, what doesn't, and learning from what others carry and use.

Despite no deer being taken, multiple sightings and consistent sign confirmed the area holds good numbers of animals.

REFLECTIONS

The Urutawa area shows strong potential, with good numbers of deer and relatively low pressure. With more time spent learning access routes and movement patterns, it could be a very productive hunting location. It's an area worth returning to—close enough for a weekend trip, with a family-friendly track and a comfortable hut setup. As a group, the mix of experience worked well, allowing knowledge to be shared and newer hunters to build confidence in real backcountry conditions.

Trips like this play an important role within the NZDA Bay of Plenty Branch, helping bring members together and strengthen the club.

CONCLUSION

Overall, the trip was a successful and worthwhile outing for everyone involved. A big thanks to Tim for organising and to all those who took part. While no deer were taken, the experience gained, lessons learned, and connections built made it a valuable trip—and one that sets the tone well for the season ahead.

I'm certainly looking forward to more club expeditions in the future.

NZDA TERMS AND CONDITIONS FOR TRADING POST LISTINGS

You may only list "A" category firearms, in sporting configuration, as defined by the Arms Act 1983. Large capacity magazines (i.e. more than 10 cartridges for .22 rimfire, or more than 5 cartridges for others) may not be sold.

Sellers must sight the firearms licence of the buyer, or for remote sales sellers must receive written confirmation signed by Police confirming the buyer holds a valid firearm's licence. Forms are available at any police station.

Firearms must already be in New Zealand. Overseas members may not buy or sell firearms on the site.



Jugged Hare Recipe

Ingredients:

1 hare, skinned and gutted
750ml of red wine
350ml of beef stock
2 bay leaves
50g of butter
1 onion, diced
2 celery sticks, sliced
1 carrot, roughly diced
4 garlic cloves, crushed
1 tsp salt
6 black peppercorns
6 juniper berries, dried
1 sprig of thyme, large
2 tsp cornflour

Directions:

- 1) First, joint the hare. I did this in a way that both diners would have one generous-sized thigh portion and a smaller leg bone each. I then cut each side of the saddle into three large chunks, so they wouldn't shrink too small during cooking and get lost in the gravy
- 2) Marinade the hare in the red wine, beef stock and bay leaves for anywhere between 5 and 36 hours. If the hare isn't fully submerged, remember to turn it from time to time so that it colours evenly
- 3) Heat the butter in a thick-based casserole dish (choose one which has a tightly fitting lid). Remove the hare from the marinade (reserving the marinade) and brown it in the butter, long enough to colour the outside of the hare but not so long that the meat starts to cook through. Remove the hare from the pan and set to one side
- 4) If needed, add a little more butter to the casserole dish. Soften the onions, celery and carrots for 10 minutes. Add the garlic and cook for a couple more minutes
- 5) Add most of the reserved marinade to the pan, keeping back 5 tablespoons for later. Bring it to a quick boil for 2 minutes
- 6) Turn down the temperature and return the hare to the pan. While the hare is on a slow simmer on the hob, grind the black pepper and juniper berries in a pestle and mortar or a dry spice grinder. Add to the pan along with a teaspoon of salt, the thyme, and bay leaves from the marinade
- 7) Preheat the oven to 140°C/gas mark 1
- 8) Place the lid tightly on the casserole dish and cook in the oven for 3 1/2 hours
- 9) Add the cornflour to the 5 tablespoons of reserved marinade and stir. Remove the hare from the oven and stir in the cornflour mixture to thicken the sauce a little and introduce a nice sheen
