SECOND ANNUAL KAIMAI MAMAKU KIWI SURVEY

THIS WEEK THE MANAAKI KAIMAI MAMAKU TRUST (MKMT)
STARTED PUBLICISING THE SECOND ANNUAL KAIMAI MAMAKU
CITIZEN SCIENCE KIWI SURVEY AND WANTED TO GIVE YOU
ALL THE HEADS UP!

We're asking all local MPs, mayors, and industry representatives to get involved, community volunteer groups, trustees, agencies and environmental organisations to participate.

Youth Seach and Rescue will have about 60 kids GPSing bait stations and doing the formal kiwi survey in June at Otanewainuku Kiwi Trust, and they'll participate in the May survey also.

It is a citizen science event with the main purpose of raising awareness of the Kaimai Mamaku restoration project and maybe even hearing kiwi so we can mobilise pest control to protect them.

The actual survey is simple, takes only a couple of hours in an evening, and no technical skills are needed.

The optimal weekend is May 13th but the survey will run for 2 weeks to allow for poor weather. More info will continue to be added at the link below:

If you're an experienced hunter, think about how your knowledge and skills could benefit those new to the adventure of hunting. If you're a novice hunter think about what you can do to prepare yourself for your next hunting adventure and grow your capabilities.

The HUNTS course is still the best way for those new to hunting to immerse themselves in the basics of hunting and establish a solid foundation of knowledge to build on in the future.

The Hunter Buddy Program provides the opportunity for those who have completed a HUNTS course to continue being mentored by more seasoned hunters as well as the opportunity for those less experienced and new to the Branch to build on their existing knowledge, while establishing relationships with other members.

BECOME A HUNTS INSTRUCTOR

Our HUNTS Instructors train and guide new hunters as they start their journey of learning to hunt. This is an opportunity to support the future of hunting in NZ through sharing your knowledge, skills and experience with aspiring hunters. To start the journey of becoming a HUNTS Instructor contact the committee to express your interest, they will need to support your application to the NZDA National Office to become a

Once you've gained Provisional Instructor status, and have started assisting with instructing on the course, you will undergo several assessments by a Nationally Qualified HUNTS Assessor.

When the assessor is satisfied with your level of competency as a HUNTS Instructor you will receive certification from the National Office granting you status as a Warranted HUNTS Instructor. To find out more about becoming a HUNTS Instructor, contact the committee by email at:

HUNTS COURSE GUIDES

Every year the HUNTS Course concludes with a guided one on one hunt, where each student is paired up with an experienced hunter for a guided hunt on publicly accessible land. The HUNTS Instructors rely on strong support from the members to have enough volunteer quides to pair with all the students.

If you enjoy sharing your knowledge, would like to help guide a novice hunter, and would like to be considered for the privilege of a catered weekend away hunting with the course students, then contact the HUNTS Instructors when the next course is advertised.

HUNTER BUDDY PROGRAM

We need experienced hunters to help mentor novice hunters. For details, see the section of this newsletter on the Hunter Buddy Program.

BECOME A RANGE OFFICER

Our Range Officers (NROs) are NZDA Nationally Qualified Range Officers. We require Range Officers to support our club range shooting activities and Range Open Days (public days).

To become a NRO you must pass the required theory and practical assessments. You will also require the support of the Branch Committee, usually granted on endorsement by the Range Manager. BECOME A RANGE ASSISTANT

If being a Range Officer isn't your thing, but you would still like to help with range events and Range Open Days, we need members to assist with the administration side of running range activities.

Duties could include administering the registration process for open days and other events, assisting with the administration of match scoring for scored shooting events, helping with setup and pack up before and after a range event, and helping with the kitchen and BBQ if required.

ANTLER, HORN & TUSK COMPETITION HELPERS

We need to establish an AHT Sub-Committee to plan and prepare for our Annual Antler, Horn & Tusk and Photographic Competitions.

This sub-committee is ideally suited to those who are qualified Douglas Score Measurers, those aspiring to become qualified or those with a strong interest in wildlife photography.

BECOME A DOUGLAS SCORE MEASURER

The AHT Competition requires Qualified Douglas Score Measurers to measuring all the heads and jaws that are entered in our annual competition. Normally this is all done on Measuring Night which is usually the third or fourth Tuesday in May.

BILLBOARD HELPERS

The three billboards at the front of our clubrooms provide our club with a good source of income in addition to member subscriptions. This relatively passive income supports as much as one third of our operating expenses, helping to provide facilities for our members while keeping subscriptions low.

From time to time these Billboards require changing, often in a short time window, usually around the end/start of the month. It only takes two blokes 30 minutes to change a billboard skin over so it's not a big time commitment.

WORKING BEES

It is commonly said amongst our members and volunteers in other clubs, "it's always the same old people" that put their hands up to help. Be one of those people, put your hand up to help.

WAS ON THIS RIDGE SYSTEM

ME, OBVIOUSLY ON A MISSION, AS
HE JUST KEPT COMING.

I waited until he was about 10 metres away and shot him. He dropped down at me feet, the closest shot I've ever had. 9 points and not too bad at all, and another head to take home. I took the back steaks and the head, then trudged back to camp.

The back steaks were really good, as I had developed a way to use them when away for long periods of time. I cut 1/3 of a back steak, cut about 5 slots into but not right through the meat.

I would rub in some Marmite, salt, and into each slot I would place an onion ring and sometimes a bit of cheese, sprinkle with flour and warp the lot in tinfoil, place into hot embers from the fire and cook. It was good to eat hot or cold and I used to take them out on the hill a lot, something tasty to chew on.

It was off this same ridge system that I found the valley of my dreams. I had dropped down in a bush saddle and headed west. I broke out into a small, open valley, stream, grass flats and surrounded by nice bush.

The grass was like my lawn at home and deer sign was everywhere. Suddenly I was in Hunter's Heaven. I had a good look around and I just didn't have enough hours that day. I found 2 things of note in there.

As I traveled upstream, I could hear the sound of water cascading and it wasn't from

the stream ahead. I followed the sound up a small side creek and there, coming out of the lower part of a solid rock wall, was a large flow of water. The hole was about 1 metre in diameter and the flow was full bore and very loud. It must have been fed from above somewhere.

The 2nd thing of note was on the main flat downstream. There was an old deer trap still in good condition and it covered about an acre.

The gate was closed and as the deer couldn't get in, the grass and vegetation was very high. It was probably some years since that gate was open, so I wired it open, with the intention of coming back in 2 days.

Well, that didn't happen, what with the weather, rivers up etc. it was 7 days before I got back there. It took me a while to find the saddle into the valley again and when I got back to the trap I could hardly believe my eyes.

All the grass was grazed down and a stag had dealt to most of the vegetation, the 2 metre height is the size they like to beat up. It was time for a good look around as there was one stroppy stag in there.

Well, I hunted hard out in the surrounding area and after about 4 hours of hard out stalking. I arrived back out to the main grass flats. I had a good look around, then stepped out on to the grass. Three paces and I could see up to the far end and there at about 200m was the stag, stock still, side on and just looking at me: a very good Westland stag indeed.

I froze and slowly loaded the rifle, the stag went from 0-50 in 4 strides, and with his head up, the large antlers folded along his flanks (that's a sight I'll never forget) he raced along the edge of the bush and disappeared around the corner.

As I didn't get a good bead on him, I didn't take a shot, but followed him and ran into 3 of his hinds, so that was the end of it. You can't win them all, and I never got back to that valley, much to my disappointment.

I had been in the Pyke for about 15 days and on returning to basecamp after fly-camping out for 2 nights, I unzipped my little tent under the main fly, and there on the floor were 2 loaves of fresh bread and a bag of fruit.

Talk about mana from heaven. To me, that was like winning the lottery, what a treat. Dave Saxton was in the area and had dropped in to see how things were and left me the food. That's just how it used to be down on the coast, and later on in life I had the chance to return a small favour

Day 18. I awoke to a blue sky day with no wind, and as the river was down, I decided to hunt up high into the Red Hills range. So off I went across the river, across the bush terraces and up into the sub-alpine area. Mid - level was thick with high fern etc, but as I got higher, it opened out a bit, so I started to sidle where most of the deer sign was.

The tops got a lot of helicopter pressure, so the deer seemed to live in the top level bush and sub-alpine regions. I saw a few hinds and about 2pm, as I came around a sharp spur, I spied a good stag bedded down about 150m away. With no breeze at all, I just watched him, and it didn't look as though he would move for some time, so I decided to take a shot.

With the sound of the shot, his head just slumped and that was the end of it. I took a

while to cross the gut and get over to him, but when I got there, I was a happy hunter.

A classic Otago - type head with good timber and purling, polished up for the roar. As I removed the head and back-steaks, it started to cloud over, so I decided to head back down to the river.

The sky darkened and half way down I got my first spits of rain. I was almost to the terraces and it was bucketing down, I was really worried about the river levels, so I went as fast as I could with the head, meat and my hunting gear.

At a steep slope things started to get really slippery and slidey and I was concerned that I might stab myself with the antlers. As luck would have it, when I broke out to the river bank, it was only about 200metres upstream from my crossing point.

Yes, the river was rising fast, but was crossable, so I grabbed my pole, left from the mornings crossing, and plunged in and just went for it.

I got back to camp, unloaded the gear and when I placed that head by the fire, I tell you, my smile was a mile wide. It rained hard for 2 days, and even the side streams became torrents, and it was 6 days before I could cross that river again.

I spent the rest of the trip just cruising the area, got to know where a few deer lived, but saw no better heads than I had back in camp. Several evenings I would sit and watch a good river flat and most times it would be just about dark before any deer came out. Yes, even in a remote area like this, the mature stags have learnt about hunters on the ground and in the air.

Only on misty or overcast mornings did the deer feed after daylight. One morning, late in

the trip, I got up at daylight, walked outside and the air was hot, the atmosphere was almost static and very still. I had this happen one other time in the hills, a few years ago. A pocket of warm air drifts down from the tropics and sits against the ridge of a mountain until dispersed by Mother Nature.

I went down to the river and the air was so warm, so not being one to let a chance go by, I raced back to camp, grabbed the toilet and washing gear, back to the river and stripped all the gears off. I soaped and scrubbed, shampooed the hair (yes the water was still very cold) washed all my clothes and sat on a rock to dry out as it was so warm.

The funny thing is, there was not one sandfly to be seen. I guess the sight of a very clean, naked hunter sitting in the riverbed was all too much. I went back to camp, hung the washing out and 2 hours later the rain set in, so it was back to normal.

Like clockwork, the 1st April saw hunters being dropped into their hunting blocks and one lot was dropped into my basecamp. They had a mountain radio with them, so I arranged for Dave Saxton to take me out the next day: he was bringing another party in.

Time to go, and as I packed my gear up I did so with mixed feelings as I was leaving some of the best hunting country that I had ever been in, and I would probably never see my Hunter Heaven valley again. Melancholy with the thought that some of the deer close to camp that I got to know would probably get shot over the next month or so.

But I was positive that I had completed a big trip that ended with most of the boxes ticked. It really was a remote area and all the time I was in there, I only saw 2 trampers out by Big Bay. Yes, they got a hell of a fright when I appeared out of the bush and said "Gidday".

Dave Saxton treated me right on the costs as it is a long trip in there. He got to fly me into the hills a few more times as he told me he liked hunters who put in the hard yards. Sadly he is no longer flying and his son Morgan, who flew me in at times, died in a helicopter crash over Lake Wanaka.

So that was the end of my longest solo trip, lots of adventures, hardship, rain, a head full of memories, new challenges and experiences, and lastly a decent red deer head for our NZDA antler competition.

Interestingly the only roars I heard in all the time I was hunting in the area, were 2 moans the day before I went out. I tried roaring at times, but the stags weren't interested at all. It must have been a late start for that season.

Lastly, the head pictured at the start of this article is not the Pyke head as I sold a property with that head mounted in a shed, and the purchaser (another hunter) asked me to leave it there so I did.

The head in the picture is mounted at my home and won the Best Red Deer club competition in 2019. It took a bit of hard yards hunting, but that is another hunt I have yet to write about.

RANGE NEWS:

REMINDER – RANGE FEES HAVE INCREASED FROM 1ST MARCH 2023:

As of 1st March 2023 (the start of the NZDA membership year) our various range fees increased. The new firearms legislation has contributed to our operating costs, plus we have ongoing maintenance and fixed costs such as insurance, power and internet to recover and lease fees to the council.

We are also increasing the public day fees to give more incentive to join NZDA so we can represent more of these occasional shooters that make up the silent majority of licenced firearm owners.

The facilities on offer at our 300m TECT Park Range are fantastic and are a great asset to our club and region but it does cost a lot to have these facilities available and range fees need to cover the costs or the range is not financially viable.

NEW FEES:

- Annual range ticket \$100
- Range access tag \$30 (one-off cost on application)
- Range Open Day non NZDA member fee \$50
- Range Open Day NZDA member (any branch) without range ticket \$25

RANGE MAINTENANCE

Thanks to our members that attend our working bees at the range - as they say, few hands make light work so it would be good to see some new faces assisting at working bees.

We have a core group of members putting in most of the hours but we know there are many more active and regular range shooters out there that should be helping.

We are currently working on extending the 100m, 200m and 300m target lines so that each firing position (1 to 15) will shoot more directly straight down the range as opposed to the slight angle that is currently needed.

This will require an extension and rebuild to the target lines. Initial earth works have been completed and the final tidy up of dirt will be completed in February.

WE NEED YOU!

We are now on the look out for someone to take on the project to build the backstop and target extension. We need someone who can lead this project, organise materials and equipment and make it happen.

NZDA BOP CLUB CHILLER

CHILLER USE RULES

- Chiller use is a privilege that may be removed if access is abused or rules not adhered to.
- Clean up after yourself, every time you access the chiller.
- Use a fish bin or other suitable container to catch dripping blood etc. and remove from site when you take your meat away.
- No skinning or butchering on the NZDA premises. The chiller is for hanging only, no processing of any sort is allowed.
- All waste must be removed from the premises when you take your meat away, including any part of an animal, blood, and all wastewater.
- All animals/meat must be tagged with a label denoting the date hung, name and contact number of the person who hung it in the chiller. Any meat without a label will be considered a donation to the club.
- The maximum time for hanging any meat or animal is 10 days.
- Do not hang any foul meat or contaminated carcasses.
- Take care not to contaminate anyone else's meat with hair, blood, dirt etc.

It is preferable to hang all carcasses with the skin on and to hang any partially processed meat in a breathable bag or muslin cloth. Hanging carcasses and meat should not touch the chiller walls or they may (partially) freeze.

Respect the facility and other members meat.

RANGE STANDING ORDERS REMINDER: "THE RANGE RULES"

Range ticket holders CANNOT allow other non-range ticket holders or non-members to shoot at our range. The name, date and time start time of shooters shall be recorded each time they use the range. Range flags and warning signs are to be enabled at the following locations prior to firing:

- The Range status sign's "Caution Range in Use" warning shall be displayed when the range is open for use.
- The red firing line flag shall be hoisted when the range is open for use.
- The firing line flag must be lowered, and the range status sign closed when the range is closed.

An empty chamber indicator (ECI) MUST be inserted in the chamber at all times except when the Range Officer allows the shooter onto the firing point and gives permission to remove the ECI.






