PRESIDENTS REPORT: JUNE 2023

THE LAST MONTH HAS BEEN VERY BUSY FOR ME AND I'VE BATTLED TO KEEP AHEAD OF MY DEERSTALKERS RESPONSIBILITIES AND MAINTAIN A WORK/LIFE BALANCE. WE STARTED MAY WITH HOSTING OUR CEO, GWYN THURLOW, AT OUR CLUB NIGHT. WHAT A GREAT EVENING THAT WAS.

For those who missed it, I encourage you to read the NZDA National Newsletter each month so you can be informed of the good work Gwyn and the team do to protect our hunting and shooting rights. The following week at our committee meeting the carpark flooded during our meeting and 13 members vehicles were damaged (mostly written-off). This has again highlighted the vulnerability of our clubrooms location.

Luckily the water didn't enter the clubrooms building and there was relatively minor damage to the property, some mulch and gravel washed away, and a few pesky rabbits didn't survive their swim.

The firearms register comes into effect on the 24th of this month. Do some reading online so you understand your responsibilities and what your best course of action is. Everyone's circumstances will be different, so you need to make sure you understand how it affects you.

The club has secured a property for fallow hunts and a group of members carried out a cull for the landowner at the end of May. This was a great success, and the landowner was very pleased with the number of animals harvested. Currently there's a lot of meat at the butcher being processed into sausages and patties for the club freezer

This is great way to cater for club BBQs. We are planning to hold a branch hunt to the property later in the year, there will be spots open to the general membership, so keep an eye on the hunts calendar and read the newsletter each month

The hunts will have limited spaces and will be tightly controlled to ensure we maintain a good working relationship with the landowner. There will be some prioritisation of hopeful participants to ensure we get the right mix of hunter capability and equipment availability. Associate members won't be eligible for hunts on this property because they don't have the insurance benefits that other membership classes receive.

Because we have such a large membership and the team managing this opportunity don't personally know everyone in the club. we will be relying on some indicators to help categorise members' capability, skill level and overall suitability for partaking in management hunts.

To increase your ranking score and improve your chances of securing a spot on one of the management hunts you can do the following: if you're new to hunting then enrol in the upcoming HUNTS Course, if you're a novice or experienced hunter you should complete the Field Marksmanship Test at the range on a Range Open Day or at a Club Shoot, volunteer at a working bee, attend club nights to meet members and build relationships, and go on some other club hunts.

BECOMING A HUNTER

HEN YOU ARE NOT A
HUNTER, YOU THINK
THAT A HUNTER
OWNS A RIFLE AND
GOES INTO THE BUSH TO SHOOT A
DEER. THEY COME HOME WITH THE
ANIMAL AND HAVE A LOT OF MEAT
FOR THEMSELVES, FAMILY, AND
FRIENDS... AND THAT'S
PRETTY MUCH IT.

I never expected the journey of a hunter to be so intense, versatile, challenging for mind and body and overall, just very different to what the overall perception of a hunter is...

So, the first step to shoot an animal is to get your firearms licence - clear as mud! Easy as. But is it though?

After having all the paperwork done and submitted to the police - the waiting game starts. I was lucky, as back in 2020 it wasn't as crazy as it was in those days, and within 4 months I was ready to do my firearms safety course as well as getting my gun cabinet and find my witnesses for the police check.



Luckily, my friends and partner were nice, and the police didn't doubt my ability to own a firearm, so that box was ticked.

The next thing on the list was the safety course. The seven rules of safety make total sense, don't get me wrong, but as a foreigner there are a few language barriers to overcome too - hunters use words that I never needed before in my life. So luckily, I had the chance to repeat the test and pass it after I did some translations.

Next up was how to handle a firearm safely... well, that is a very good question! I had held and fired a rifle before in my life a couple of times, but always got it given to me - not that I had to pick it up, put a bullet it, load it... so the whole process was a bit overwhelming! That wasn't expected! But hey, how could I have known?





Well, it seems like I got it all right and passed the safety course! A few weeks later I had my firearms licence in the mail - great! By February 2021 I was able to purchase a firearm and shoot some animals... but wait... what would I buy? What do I need? Where do I go? What can I shoot?

So many questions and where do I go to learn all of this? With so much insecurity and no family and friends in the country who hunt, there was no one to ask, no one to take me and no one to help me with all of that.

I remembered that at the safety course we had been told about a "HUNTS Course" - a course to learn how to be a hunter. Well, that sounded like me - something I was keen on trying and at least know what to do now with my firearms licence. I had to wait until August until the course started, so hunting was "on hold" during that time for me.

Come August I walked into my local NZDA Branch to start my course. Wow - what a new experience. Around nineteen other people were with me, young, old, male, "I REMEMBERED THAT AT

female, more experienced hunters, some novice hunters, a good mixture.

The course started and I quickly understood that I pretty much knew nothing. What a language! Hunters definitely have their own vocabulary! Velvet, rut, roar, red, fallow, sika... what? I thought there were just deer! I also didn't even expect to have that many different species in New Zealand. I realised I had a lot to learn about the animals, how they behave, what they eat, where they sleep.

"THE COURSE STARTED AND I QUICKLY UNDERSTOOD THAT I PRETTY MUCH KNEW NOTHING. WHAT A LANGUAGE! HUNTERS DEFINITELY HAVE THEIR OWN VOCABULARY! VELVET, RUT, ROAR, RED, FALLOW, SIKA... WHAT? I THOUGHT THERE WERE JUST DEER!"

The HUNTS Course was great! From learning all the practical stuff in the bush, we also went to the shooting range to shoot some firearms. Fantastic! This really gives you the confidence in a controlled environment to shoot a rifle - and different rifles. Which one is the right one for me? Which should I buy? What do I want to achieve with it? What do I want to shoot and where and how do I want to hunt? So many questions I still had to answer before finally purchasing my first rifle.

This is now approximately one year after I received my firearms licence in the mail... one year on and I finally knew (kind of) what sort of rifle I wanted and what sort of hunting I want to start with. The people I met were the biggest help to lead me along the way.

Now what? Now that I had spent a fortune on a rifle, some fancy hunting gear, and my basics - what do I do now? I don't know the 'farm' everyone talks about...the one where you just drive to, shoot a few deer, pick them up with a quadbike and come back home... I had to find them!

Thanks to Topo Maps I found areas where you can hunt on public land, so the next



weekend my partner and I packed our bags and left for the bush - easy! Apparently, plenty of deer around everyone said!

Oh really? After a full long weekend in the bush - we found some poo. That was pretty much it! Where were all the deer? Why did we not see a single one?

Apparently, we were too fast and too loud? Really? Ok, next weekend back into the bush! Slower, quieter, but man it is hard in the thick bush! Everything is crunchy, every step could scare the deer away. Wind! Have we thought about the wind? Which direction does it blow? Do they smell us before we can even see them?

A year on from here, we were still hunting on public land, almost every weekend. Still no deer, still very frustrated! Too fast and too loud still? Why can't we see them? It is a journey! So much to learn about nature, the animals, the environment you are moving in. It is the deer's environment, and they know how to behave: they are smarter than you and use all their senses.

I did not know that as a hunter it is important to use your eyes, ears, nose, breath to control your hunt. All those senses need to be aligned to be successful. Merge with your surroundings, be one with nature like the deer are. Sounds easy right? But man, it is hard!

And the worst of it all - patience! Something which I am not good at and need to get better at! A deer does not have a watch, doesn't have a plan, doesn't have a schedule... they can just watch you and not move forever! (Or at least it seems like this).

After a year, we were fortunate enough to get invited to a couple of farms to at least

shoot a deer. To learn how it feels and what else is involved. The carrying, skinning, chilling, butchering, vacuum packing of the meet is a whole new learning curve!

All those are the things you do not think about before! Learning about the different parts of the body of the deer, trying new recipes, giving away the meat and appreciating the fresh, unprocessed meat you can put on the table is amazing. But a lot of work!

We finally have shot our first animal in the bush - after a 14.5-hour day stalking, spooking several deer, being tired and hungry and grumpy and just before sunset we could shoot one down a riverbank. Not to mention that you climb down there in the dark with the torch to gut it to carry it out...

Hunting is not just shooting an animal! Hunting is an adventure, hunting is merging with the bush and the environment, hunting is learning about deer and understanding their behaviour.

Hunting is caring for your environment, hunting is making new friends, learning new skills, creating amazing meals, sitting on camp fires, hiking for miles, getting up early and appreciate the hard work and exhaustion which goes into that perfect piece of meat on your plate.

I learnt a lot in the last couple of years on my journey of becoming a hunter and I am just at the start of it but in all honesty - I am glad about what it taught me, and I am always hungry for more!

The purpose of the Hunter Buddy Program is 'To provide an opportunity for new members and postHUNTS course graduate hunters to gain valuable experience with more seasoned hunters, in order to develop and consolidate skills and knowledge.

In addition to this, the program aims *to establish friendships and support networks for new hunters within the club to enable them to feel a sense of

belonging to a hunting community of outdoor enthusiasts

If you're an experienced hunter, think about how your knowledge and skills could benefit those new to the adventure of hunting. If you're a novice hunter think about what you can do to prepare yourself for your next hunting adventure and grow your capabilities.

The HUNTS course is still the best way for those new to hunting to immerse themselves in the basics of hunting and establish a solid foundation of knowledge to build on in the future.

The Hunter Buddy Program provides the opportunity for those who have completed a HUNTS course to continue being mentored by more seasoned hunters as well as the opportunity for those less experienced and new to the Branch to build on their existing knowledge, while establishing relationships with other members.

TERRYS FIRST DEER

THE ROAR WAS IN FULL "NOISE", LITERALLY AND I WAS ON A 6-DAY BUSH TRIP INTO THE RUAHINE MOUNTAIN RANGE NEAR MANGAWEKA WITH MY VERY EXPERIENCED MATE, SHANE. WE SET UP OUR TARP & HOOCHIE CAMP AT 750M ASL AND HUNTED THROUGH AN ELEVATION RANGE OF 650M TO 950M.

There had been a dump of snow the night before we went in, down as low as 1,000m - 1,200m and it looked like someone had sprinkled "icing sugar" over the trees. So, it was pretty



fresh and also quite damp as we had our share of showers and rain, "freight train" winds but some moments of sun too... pretty normal right!

By day four, Shane had already shot a stag and two hinds so I really felt this could be my time!

It was the 1st of April 2023 and we had got going at first light to stalk a stag that had started roaring really close to camp, early enough to be competing with the night sounds of our resident Morepork and fighting possums and still going by the time the pair of resident NZ Pigeons started to move about at dawn!

After a couple of hours, with no contact with the stag we decided to split-up for our usual solo day-hunt session, with protocols in place for radio contact and in the event of an emergency, PLB activation.

I had just made my way up a steep spur, climbing 200 vertical meters to the main ridge that would take me back down in the direction of camp. There was fresh sign everywhere and it felt good. At 1.45pm I stopped momentarily to hydrate and double check my location.

Then just as I was taking a directional bearing to guide me back towards camp down the ridge, I noticed the head and shoulders of a hind partially obscured by a bush some 40 meters below me. I realised she was actually on the small side, last season's but I decided to have a go.

She was eating and had looked up and around a couple of times, but the wind was in my favour. I had to manoeuvre a few meters to my right to get a clear shot

and my moment came a few seconds later. I squeezed the trigger, re-loaded and waited, but she had dropped where she had stood.

After making safe and pocketing the spent cartridge, I inhaled and exhaled deeply with a sense of personal achievement and relief, together with the respect for my quarry and the higher purpose of conservation.

As per our protocol, I turned on my radio, called up Shane, who on hearing the shot was already waiting for my call. We exchanged a few words and as expected shared the significance of the moment. We had hunted together for a long time, and I had learnt a great deal, so now it felt like graduation day!

It was getting late, so I got onto dressing my hind, cooled the meat as quick as possible and then once all packed away headed down the ridge then with a short sidle to the left, headed into camp.

What a trip... what a day, and as the light faded into

the sounds of the night, I drifted off to sleep, content that today I had shot my first deer!

Once you've gained Provisional Instructor status, and have started assisting with instructing on the course, you will undergo several assessments by a Nationally Qualified HUNTS Assessor.

HUNTS COURSE GUIDES

Every year the HUNTS Course concludes with a guided one on one hunt, where each student is paired up with an experienced hunter for a guided hunt on publicly accessible land. The HUNTS Instructors rely on strong support from the members to have enough volunteer quides to pair with all the students.

If you enjoy sharing your knowledge, would like to help guide a novice hunter, and would like to be considered for the privilege of a catered weekend away hunting with the course students, then contact the HUNTS Instructors when the next course is advertised.

HUNTER BUDDY PROGRAM

We need experienced hunters to help mentor novice hunters. For details, see the section of this newsletter on the Hunter Buddy Program.

BECOME A RANGE OFFICER

Our Range Officers (NROs) are NZDA Nationally Qualified Range Officers. We require Range Officers to support our club range shooting activities and Range Open Days (public days).

To become a NRO you must pass the required theory and practical assessments. You will also require the support of the Branch Committee, usually granted on endorsement by the Range Manager. Duties could include administering the registration process for open days and other events, assisting with the administration of match scoring for scored shooting events, helping with setup and pack up before and after a range event, and helping with the kitchen and BBQ if required.

ANTLER, HORN & TUSK COMPETITION HELPERS

We need to establish an AHT Sub-Committee to plan and prepare for our Annual Antler, Horn & Tusk and Photographic Competitions.

This sub-committee is ideally suited to those who are qualified Douglas Score Measurers, those aspiring to become qualified or those with a strong interest in wildlife photography.

BECOME A DOUGLAS SCORE MEASURER

H.U.N.T.S COURSE INFO PACK

THINK SAFETY / PRACTICE SAFETY / HUNT SAFELY

BACKGROUND

The Bay of Plenty Branch (BoP) of the New Zealand Deerstalkers Association (NZDA) conduct a Hunter National Training Scheme (HUNTS) course each year that usually runs from July to September. Please click here to view the full course information. The NZDA HUNTS programme is administered by the NZDA through its National office in Wellington.

It is designed to ensure that students receive a good background to most facets of the recreational sport of hunting in New Zealand. This ensures the continued safe practices encouraged by the NZDA, with respect to safe firearms handling, conservation and bush craft.

CURRICULUM

The course is intense and concentrates on the main topics associated with the recreational hunter under field conditions within New Zealand. The curriculum includes:

ETHICS AND ECOLOGY:

Students will learn about NZDA hunting ethics to enable them to promote the sport within New Zealand as well as a presentation by qualified instructors on Ecology and the Flora and Fauna of New Zealand.

FIREARMS LAW AND SAFETY, MARKSMANSHIP:

A firearms licence is NOT required to attend this course. Students will lean firearm safety and be shown the types of firearm used for hunting New Zealand game species.

They will learn how to correctly apply the principles of marksmanship, the care and cleaning of the firearm as well as use of the firearm under range and field conditions

OUTDOOR FIRST AID:

Students will learn under qualified instructors, how to identify & treat the signs and symptoms of hypothermia as well as burns, fractures, cuts, building stretchers out of what's available in the bush and many other aspects of Outdoor First Aid.

THE DOUGLAS SCORING SYSTEM:

Students will be shown how to measure their trophies correctly under the Douglas Scoring System adopted by NZDA. All game species of New Zealand will be included.

BUSH CRAFT:

Students will learn under practical conditions the many aspects of bush craft taught by instructors with many years of practical experience.

PLANNING:

Students will be taught how to plan a hunting trip and what equipment may be needed.

NAVIGATION:

Students will be taught how to navigate using a map and compass.

RIVER CROSSING:

Students will be taught safe and responsible river crossing procedures.

HUNTING TECHNIQUES:

Students will be taught how to hunt safely and effectively and learn techniques from instructors who have made this their chosen sport for many years.

The course consists of several evening sessions at the branch clubrooms, a range day, practical weekend and culminates in a weekend hunt paired up one on one with an experienced hunter.

ELIGIBILITY

The course is open to all over the age of 16 years old. Younger teenagers may be considered if their parents are also attending the course - please enquire via email.

The course is restricted to 15 participants. The first 15 paid up will have priority.

EQUIPMENT:

A training manual is supplied to each participant as part of the course.

You will need to bring a pen and paper (and enthusiasm).

Basic equipment will be required for the practical and hunting weekend trips. A list of

essential equipment will be provided prior to these events to ensure students obtain the right type of equipment and come suitably prepared.

FEES

The 2023 course fees have been set at: \$450

This covers the cost of materials, resources, accommodation and food during the course. NZDA Bay of Plenty Branch is a registered charity and does not aim to profit from the HUNTS course. The course is offered as a public service for the benefit of aspiring hunters.

For insurance purposes, course participants must be financial members of NZDA. (Associate membership is inadequate as it doesn't include insurance benefits.)

We will waive the \$50 joining fee if you are attending the HUNTS course.

QUALIFICATION

At the successful completion of the course, students will be presented with a certificate endorsing their achievement.

NZDA BOP CLUB CHILLER

CHILLER USE RULES

- Chiller use is a privilege that may be removed if access is abused or rules not adhered to.
- Clean up after yourself, every time you access the chiller.
- Use a fish bin or other suitable container to catch dripping blood etc. and remove from site when you take your meat away.
- No skinning or butchering on the NZDA premises. The chiller is for hanging only, no processing of any sort is allowed.
- All waste must be removed from the premises when you take your meat away, including any part of an animal, blood, and all wastewater.
- All animals/meat must be tagged with a label denoting the date hung, name and contact number of the person who hung it in the chiller. Any meat without a label will be considered a donation to the club.
- The maximum time for hanging any meat or animal is 10 days.
- Do not hang any foul meat or contaminated carcasses.
- Take care not to contaminate anyone else's meat with hair, blood, dirt etc.

It is preferable to hang all carcasses with the skin on and to hang any partially processed meat in a breathable bag or muslin cloth. Hanging carcasses and meat should not touch the chiller walls or they may (partially) freeze.

Respect the facility and other members meat.

RANGE STANDING ORDERS REMINDER: "THE RANGE RULES"

Range ticket holders CANNOT allow other non-range ticket holders or non-members to shoot at our range. The name, date and time start time of shooters shall be recorded each time they use the range. Range flags and warning signs are to be enabled at the following locations prior to firing:

- The Range status sign's "Caution Range in Use" warning shall be displayed when the range is open for use.
- The red firing line flag shall be hoisted when the range is open for use.
- The firing line flag must be lowered, and the range status sign closed when the range is closed.

An empty chamber indicator (ECI) MUST be inserted in the chamber at all times except when the Range Officer allows the shooter onto the firing point and gives permission to remove the ECI.






