The Whanganui property mentioned in last months newsletter is a fantastic opportunity for our club, for branch hunts and the HUNTS Course program. A group of members undertook a second management hunt with good numbers harvested again.

We have shown what the branch is capable of, and the landowner is pleased with the results. There is a third management hunt planned for July before lambing starts in August.

After the July hunt we will be discussing with the landowner the number of deer remaining on the property and the approach to future hunts to maintain deer numbers at an acceptable density that doesn't unduly impact on farming productivity.

We are hoping to organise a branch hunt for October, after lambing and before fawning, with more hunts planned for next year. Read the newsletter each month, read the club emails and keep an eye on Facebook to stay informed of opportunities as they come available.

If you're hoping to secure a spot on a future hunt to a property under our Hunter Assist program, be sure to maintain a full benefits membership (you need the insurance), take the opportunity to gauge your shooting skills by completing our Field Marksmanship Test at our 300m Rifle Range at TECT Park on a Range Open Day or Club Shoot, and get along to some club events to get to know other members. "...BE SURE TO MAINTAIN A FULL BENEFITS MEMBERSHIP (YOU NEED THE INSURANCE), TAKE THE OPPORTUNITY TO GAUGE YOUR SHOOTING SKILLS BY COMPLETING OUR FIELD MARKSMANSHIP TEST AT OUR 300M RIFLE RANGE AT TECT PARK ON A RANGE OPEN DAY OR CLUB SHOOT, AND GET ALONG TO SOME CLUB EVENTS TO GET TO KNOW OTHER MEMBERS."

Meat from the May management hunt in Whanganui was processed by Mr Meat Man in June and there's now 150kg of venison sausages and patties in the club freezers for club events and BBQs.

Thanks to those members who donated some of their harvest to club, and thanks to Bruce and Tracey for the excellent butchery service.

Winter is a great time for hunting, meat keeps well hanging in a tree in the cold air so hunting trips focused on harvesting can extend for more than a couple of days without the meat spoiling.

There are branch hunts coming up so get registered and enjoy some exercise and hunting without the heat ruining your meat.

NZDA BOP BRANCH TRIP WITH A DIFFERENCE FINLAND HUNTING TRIP

WAS CLEANING OUT MY HUNTING FILE THE OTHER DAY AND CAME ACROSS THESE TWO ITEMS FROM THE BRANCH. THE FIRST WAS A BRANCH HUNT WE WERE GOING TO RUN INTO FINLAND AND UP TO THE RUSSIAN BORDER IN 2008. There was a lot of interest from the club members, so we had to limit the number of hunters to 10, and I was one of the lucky ones who signed up and paid the deposit for the airfares etc. "Wow, what a trip, and right outside of my comfort zone, that's for sure."

Although I was fit, we still had to train as there would be a lot of sled - pulling and snow - plodding to do. The big test for me

ev-Singapore-Frankfurt-Helsinki, 35hours approx.) Time: 4th November, 2008. (Auckland-S Duration: 2 1/2 to 3 weeks approx

Costs: Airline - approx \$2000.000 (includes internal flight in Finland - EURO €300.00) + extras \$2000-\$3000 (for hotels, food, incidentals and gifts for our hosts;

@\$5000.00 (note this is NZ dollars).

Extras: Taxidermy, expediting of heads/skins, any other trips, shopping, ice hotel and ice sauna, etc.

Hunting license – \in 24.00 per person, test is \in 25.00 per time. (This cost is repeated if you have to take the test again.)

Shooting Test.

Part 1 - (for big game – Moose, bear, etc.) Consists of 3 shots – standing freehand – at a stationary mocen target at 75 meters. The target is 15cm diameter, you must fire 3 shots into the target in 10 seconds, starting with the gun down (i.e. not already mounted to the shoulder.). If you miss any of the shots on the target you fail the test.

Part 2 – Gun handling procedure and correct protocol are discussed and you are viewed but Police and there officials present at the test area. Antit has arranged an exception for us to not have to complete the written exam.

Part 3 – Running target. Full size moose target at 75 meters – the target passes three times. I pass for each shot. Once again if you miss any of the shots you must take the whole test again (from I) and pay the new fee of E25 00. If you fail the whole test on the third attempt you cannot re-apply to take the test again until the same time next year. With practice everyone in the group should pass tasily.

Itinerary.

Jay I. Arrive at Helsinki. Tatu will pick us up in a minibus (10 seater VW) @ 6:45pm. Travel to Kotka (2 rrs), to hotel for sauna and drinks, prep for following day.

Test to be completed following day after arrival. Coming back to hotel again and relax, sight seeing, etc. Hopefully celebrating everyone passing shooting test with flying colours!

Day 2. Wake 4.45am, drive 2 ½ hrs to hunting area near Russian border, drop off one or two guys at 'driven moose stand'. We continue 20 min further on with moose dogs. Shooting numbers are drawn from a hat. Permit for 4 moose. Stop hunting when we run out of light @ 2pm approx. (very short daylight

Day 3-5

was the free-standing shooting test with a big bore, heavy gun. That wasn't easy to do. So, on Dean Maisey's advice, I practiced with a .22 rifle and got a lot better at the standing shots. But when I tried with the big guns, there were still a lot of Hail Mary shots, so I just did more practice.

The trip was into the final planning stages, when the club decided to pull the plug. A pity really, as I would have liked to find out just how we would have performed in those extreme arctic conditions. The photos are of two large bull moose that we had a close encounter with in USA, and yes, they are big.

I'm now not sure if I would actually shoot one what would I do with all that meat?



GALATEA HUNT

UCKED SECURELY BENEATH THE UREWERA FOOTHILLS SITS THE GALATEA HUT. THANKS TO THE GENEROSITY OF A LOCAL FARMER CALLED CHARLES, WE WERE ABLE TO HUNKER DOWN IN HIS COMPACT 6 MAN HUT COMPLETE WITH FIREPLACE AND HOT WATER OVER THE WEEKEND OF THE 12 – 14TH MAY. THE WEATHER WAS THANKFULLY SETTLED AFTER A WEEK OF YET ANOTHER HOWLING GALE AND DAILY CONSULTATION WITH METVU, WONDERING IF WE WERE GOING TO BE ABLE TO MAKE IT HAPPEN.

Thankfully, Friday dawned clear, fine and crisp as we made the easy 2 hour drive to the hut and settled in for the evening. A few of the early arrivals went off for an evening recce to suss out the surrounding lay of the land (very steep) then we cranked up the bbq for a bit of fresh venison and washed it down with a few beers. We scanned our printed maps, chose our areas, and had a few yarns before turning in for the night.

The new day was again clear skies and cool temperatures as the crew sculled back their first mug of coffee and set about gearing themselves up for a full day in the bush. It always takes longer than you think it will to get all your bits and pieces sorted and get going.

Finally, when daylight was already half an hour ahead of me, I briskly walked across the paddocks crackling with frost, away from the hut, towards my hunting block. My mission was to get into the foothills up to 400m as that was where the most sign had been spotted the evening before. Elsie, my wannabe hunting dog has developed a knack for showing me the easiest way up a mountain recently and I was grateful for this as she picked her way through the blackberry in the low-lying grassy area before the bush took over.

We slowly made our way up the hillside. Slipping in the wet mud and hauling myself up metre by metre, Elsie would stop and look back at me like I was some ginormous clumsy oaf as she skipped along all 5 kilos in bodyweight, ahead of me. We climbed up to a clearing I'd seen on topo maps previously as the ground began to level out and open up into an area surrounded by huge old manuka and podocarps.

A few healthy looking ponga trees were dotted about but mostly clear up to 20 metres ahead. I paused here and took a look around. Plenty of sign and as predicted at about the 400m mark. A hind that was out of sight must have been hoping I'd



move on through as within a few seconds of stopping she took off through the undergrowth crashing her way to freedom and leaving me sitting there cursing that I'd not spotted her beforehand.

I carried on again through the steep terrain. Making my way across the face of the mountain, following the path of least resistance on game trails and trying to stay as quiet as possible. After 1km of picking our way along the hillside we came up to a natural rocky outcrop. It rose up in sharp contrast to the rest of the mountain and was impossible to climb.

Carefully we edged ourselves underneath it and stepped along the sheerness of the slope till we got to a ridge line where it started to level out. away from us. There was no visible sign before spooking her, so it took both myself and Elsie by surprise. The deer were definitely there. We just weren't getting the drop on them in time.



The day rolled on. Cool gullies became warm and buzzing with insects as everything made the most of the fine weather. We stopped for lunch at a spot where some significant tree rubbing showed the extent of the damage roaring stags can have on the bark of trees. I filmed it as Elsie sniffed the scents around it and decided to make a snack out of some fresh sign.

We stayed here for over half an hour. I drifted off into a short bush nap which after the snoring the night before in the hut made up for some of the lost zzz's. It gets dark in the bush very quickly and the area I'd hoped to cover wasn't going to be possible before dark.

So, I turned my pooch down the hill and headed back

towards home. After 4pm it was almost pitch black as we broke out onto of the lowland area and sat for a while on the boundary fence waiting for the deer to pop out of the bush for an evening feed.

Sitting there in total silence watching the orange-tinged horizon drift into indigo I felt again super grateful for the physical fitness to cover the ground I'd covered that day and the generosity of others to be able to sit there soaking up the view.

A dark shape hovering along the edge of the bush line in the darkness caught my attention. Unfortunately, a rabbit caught my dog's attention at the same time as she burst up onto her back legs like a kangaroo wanting to chase after it. This caused the hind in the distance to bark her alarm at being disturbed and I grudgingly called it a night. We made our way along the 2km's of paddock under a clear sky punctuated by stars towards the hut and a hot meal. Again, we gathered around the macrocarpa table and shared our stories about the terrain we'd encountered that day and any animals we'd spotted. It was funny seeing one guy's photo of his very hairy legs completely covered in grass seed from a plant that has little seeds that stick to everything.

His story about finding the trail camera and giving it a friendly greeting were also good banter. It was really good to hear one of our young buddy hunters share his day with us. That new hunter vibe never gets old for me. It's so awesome seeing someone else get completely hooked into the hunting addiction and I'm stoked that lain graciously took him out to get some experience.

While we slept that night the weather changed, and we awoke to a humid, cloudy day with the possibility of more rain. This time I managed to get away just on daylight and found a mint pathway up into the hills that cost me a fraction of the mahi I'd spent the previous day.

Someone had marked the trees as an easier way of getting up into the clearing. I was pushed for time and couldn't carry on as we were due to meet back at the hut by midday and pack up our belongings. Wishing that time wasn't an issue, I promised myself I'd get back to that easy track the next time we stayed there as Elsie and I once again trekked back down towards the reality of routines and the real world.

I'm super pleased about our ability to hunt there as a club and look forward to going back again next year. Thanks go out to the whole crew who made it a great weekend and a great time away. Since Covid, nothing about my hunting experience is ever taken for granted. Even if it's just hiking with a rifle. Our recent



extreme weather events or a decision made in an office miles away from here makes me appreciate every minute I get to spend in the bush with my dog and a rifle.

HUNTS COURSE GUIDES

Every year the HUNTS Course concludes with a guided one on one hunt, where each student is paired up with an experienced hunter for a guided hunt on publicly accessible land. The HUNTS Instructors rely on strong support from the members to have enough volunteer guides to pair with all the students.

If you enjoy sharing your knowledge, would like to help guide a novice hunter, and would like to be considered for the privilege of a catered weekend away hunting with the course students, then contact the HUNTS Instructors when the next course is advertised.

HUNTER BUDDY PROGRAM

We need experienced hunters to help mentor novice hunters. For details, see the section of this newsletter on the Hunter Buddy Program.

BECOME A RANGE OFFICER

Our Range Officers (NROs) are NZDA Nationally Qualified Range Officers. We require Range Officers to support our club range shooting activities and Range Open Days (public days).

To become a NRO you must pass the required theory and practical assessments. You will also require the support of the Branch Committee, usually granted on endorsement by the Range Manager. To find out when the next Range Officers' course is, contact our Range Manager Royce Downes at: range@deerstalkersbop.org.nz.

BECOME A RANGE ASSISTANT

If being a Range Officer isn't your thing, but you would still like to help with range events and Range Open Days, we need members to assist with the administration side of running range activities.

Duties could include administering the registration process for open days and other events, assisting with the administration of match scoring for scored shooting events, helping with setup and pack up before and after a range event, and helping with the kitchen and BBQ if required.

ANTLER, HORN & TUSK COMPETITION HELPERS

We need to establish an AHT Sub-Committee to plan and prepare for our Annual Antler, Horn & Tusk and Photographic Competitions.

This sub-committee is ideally suited to those who are qualified Douglas Score Measurers, those aspiring to become qualified or those with a strong interest in wildlife photography.

BECOME A DOUGLAS SCORE MEASURER

The AHT Competition requires Qualified Douglas Score Measurers to measuring all the heads and jaws that are entered in our annual competition. Normally this is all done on Measuring Night which is usually the third or fourth Tuesday in May.

BILLBOARD HELPERS

WORKING BEES

RANGE MAINTENANCE

Thanks to our members that attend our working bees at the range - as they say, few hands make light work so it would be good to see some new faces assisting at working bees.

We have a core group of members putting in most of the hours but we know there are many more active and regular range shooters out there that should be helping.

We are currently working on extending the 100m, 200m and 300m target lines so that each firing position (1 to 15) will shoot more directly straight down the range as opposed to the slight angle that is currently needed.

This will require an extension and rebuild to the target lines. Initial earth works have been completed.

NZDA BOP CLUB CHILLER

CHILLER USE RULES

- Chiller use is a privilege that may be removed if access is abused or rules not adhered to.
- Clean up after yourself, every time you access the chiller.
- Use a fish bin or other suitable container to catch dripping blood etc. and remove from site when you take your meat away.
- No skinning or butchering on the NZDA premises. The chiller is for hanging only, no processing of any sort is allowed.
- All waste must be removed from the premises when you take your meat away, including any part of an animal, blood, and all wastewater.
- All animals/meat must be tagged with a label denoting the date hung, name and contact number of the person who hung it in the chiller. Any meat without a label will be considered a donation to the club.
- The maximum time for hanging any meat or animal is 10 days.
- Do not hang any foul meat or contaminated carcasses.
- Take care not to contaminate anyone else's meat with hair, blood, dirt etc.

It is preferable to hang all carcasses with the skin on and to hang any partially processed meat in a breathable bag or muslin cloth. Hanging carcasses and meat should not touch the chiller walls or they may (partially) freeze.

Respect the facility and other members meat.

RANGE STANDING ORDERS REMINDER: "THE RANGE RULES"

Range ticket holders CANNOT allow other non-range ticket holders or non-members to shoot at our range. The name, date and time start time of shooters shall be recorded each time they use the range. Range flags and warning signs are to be enabled at the following locations prior to firing:

- The Range status sign's 'Caution Range in Use' warning shall be displayed when the range is open for use.
- The red firing line flag shall be hoisted when the range is open for use.
- The firing line flag must be lowered, and the range status sign closed when the range is closed.

An empty chamber indicator (ECI) MUST be inserted in the chamber at all times except when the Range Officer allows the shooter onto the firing point and gives permission to remove the ECI.

- 5. Pay a \$10-20 donation per trip, on return, for hire of the unit.




